## HONOR SEAT FOR BENNETT IN COMMONS

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—As long as Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, former Prime Minister, represents Calgary west the seat of honor next to the Conservative leader in the Commons, it was learned tonight in circles close to the new leader.

While it is understood Dr. Manion has not yet worked out the seating arrangements on the front Conservative benches for the coming session that much has been decided.

It is also understood Hon. H. H. Stevens who recently announced he would support Dr. Manion after his estrangement from the party will move into the Conservative block of seats and be allotted a place not far from Dr. Manion.

The opposition leader's place is directly opposite that of the Prime Minister and about one-third of the length of the House down from the Speaker's seat. Seats are arranged in pairs and Mr. Bennett's place will be at Dr. Manion's side, just one place along the row from the front row whether he occupies it or not.

## American Medical Association Plans To Fight Charges

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—A legal fight is being waged with major jurisdiction over the future history of medical care in the United States began today when a federal grand jury indicted the American Medical Association, three affiliated societies, and 21 leading physicians on a charge of violating the Sherman Anti-trust Act.

The Medical Association announced immediately that it would throw all its energies into the battle against the charge. Dr. Morris Fishbein, leader in the Association, said at Chicago that its house of delegates had authorized its board of directors to "defend the case to the limit."

The indictment grows out of a fight by organized medicine against Group Health Association, Inc., a co-operative set-up in Washington to provide medical care for Government workers who pay personal, risk-sharing fees in advance.

The charge is that the defendants conspired to restrict trade by preventing physicians hired by the co-operative from practicing in Washington hospitals or consulting with other doctors. It is also alleged that a doctor was ousted from the district of Columbia Medical Society because of his work with the co-operative and that proceedings were started against another for the same reason.

Thurman Arnold, new assistant attorney general who contends the Anti-Trust laws have not been rigorously enforced in the past, instituted the action against the Medical Association and the others named defendants today.

Indications are that the Association may carry the case to the United States Supreme Court, if necessary, with the contention that its operations cannot be restricted by the Sherman Act since medicine is not a trade but a profession. Attorneys for the Association have emphasized that point repeatedly.

## Franco-Canadian Treaty Concluded

PARIS, Dec. 20.—(CP)—Foreign Minister Bonnet of France and Philippe Roy, Canadian Minister, today signed an exchange of letters putting into effect a new Franco-Canadian Trade Treaty.

The agreement abrogated the Anglo-Moroccan Accord of 1856 as it applied to Canada and established new commercial relations with references to French Morocco and Canada.

Bonnet also expressed France's thanks to Mr. Roy who will retire soon after 28 years of service.

## Foreign Policy Chief Issue In By-election

CHIEFF, Scotland, Dec. 20.—(CP)—Kinross and West Perth voters will ballot tomorrow on the plea of the Duchess of Atholl for support in her opposition to the foreign policy of the Chamberlain Government.

Conservative Member of the House of Commons for the district since 1923 and formerly a staunch supporter of the Government, the Duchess is running as an independent against William Menair Snadden, Conservative farmer.

Heavy snow drifts blocked roads, hampered election campaigners and threatened to reduce the vote. Political observers speculated upon the personal popularity of the Atholl family as a factor in the ballot. The Duke of Atholl owns 200,000 acres in this area. Many of his tenants are considered supporters of the Duchess.

It was conceded that a victory for Mr. Snadden would be an important one for the Government. The election has been fought on the sole ground of foreign policy. The Duchess of Atholl opposes the Government on its policies in regard to Spain and Czechoslovakia in particular.

## Green, Red Color Scheme Urged For Christmas Dinner

TORONTO, Dec. 20.—(CP)—To Canadian housewives faced with the annual problem what to serve as supplementary vegetables to potatoes at the family Christmas dinner, Toronto dietitians recommended today that they follow a green-and-red color scheme and dish up brussels sprouts and mashed turnips.

The traditional creamy mashed potatoes, piled beside the roast turkey and adorned with cranberry sauce, should be balanced by light greens, the food experts agreed. And two to one they favored brussels sprouts. Their light green a contrast to the reddish tinge of turnips.

The dietetic poll brought out such "second choices" as green beans, green peas, beans, creamed cauliflower and creamed celery. Two dietitians suggested broccoli as excellent in counteracting the richness of the Christmas dinner—for those who don't care for brussels sprouts—while one mentioned candied sweet potatoes.

All agreed with Miss Violet M. Riley, department-store dietitian, that what housewives should try to select is "something very, very light." In choosing their vegetables, they should keep the color motif in mind, with emphasis upon red and green.

## Will Visit Berlin On Refugee Problem

LONDON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—George Rublee, executive director of the International Refugee Office, was expected to present counter-proposals to a scheme brought to London last week by Dr. Hjalmar Schach, President of the Reichsbank.

All 32 Governments represented on the committee established at a conference last summer in Evian—Le-Bains, France, will be asked for their approval before Mr. Rublee leaves London for Berlin, probably next week, on the invitation of Field Marshal Goerring, chief of the Nazi four-year economic self-sufficiency plan.

## Pontiff's Health Reported Good

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Pope Pius XI knelt today in a long prayer of thanksgiving that his life had been spared to enter the 67th year of his priesthood.

He prayed after mass in his private chapel, surrounded by flowers sent from all parts of Italy and from as far away as Paris by his devout admirers.

A Vatican news service reported the 81-year-old Holy Father's health was good. He suffered an attack of cardiac asthma Nov. 22. The Pontiff held his scheduled audiences today, receiving five Cardinals and four other Vatican officials.
