Answer To Be Promptly Forwarded

ALBANY, N. Y., July 26. (A.P.)—Mayor Walker today advised Governor Franklin J. Roosevelt he had received the galley proofs of his reply to ouster charges and as soon as they were read and revised, and the printing completed the "answer would be promptly forwarded to Albany." A telegram from the Mayor was the first word Mr. Roosevelt had had from Mr. Walker since the Governor sent the ouster charges and a request for a reply to New York City on June 12.

The demand for Walker's removal by Roosevelt was based on a legislative investigation conducted by Samuel Seabury, former member of the court of appeals.

Political students still consider the Governor's handling of the Walker charges an important factor in his candidacy. Removal of Walker, it is believed, would strengthen Mr. Roosevelt in the South and West and might weaken him in New York City. Exonerating Walker would have the opposite effect.

Denied Admittance Until Admission Paid

MANCHU, Manchuria, July 26. (A.P.)—Passengers arriving today aboard the trans-Siberian Express were denied admittance by Manchoukuo authorities until they had paid \$16 Mexican (currently about \$5) for a new Manchoukuo visa.

Some of the passengers protested that Manchoukuo was not recognized as yet by any foreign state, but their argument was unavailing.

In fact the same fate befell the official Soviet courier aboard the train who, despite his diplomatic visa, was obliged to submit also to baggage examination.

Meanwhile in anticipation of the seizure of the Manchurian postal service August 1 by Manchoukuo authorities, the postal commissioners at Harbin and Mukden, a Briton and an Italian respectively, were reported to have resigned today under instructions from Nanking.

BRAIN CONTROLS 10 PER CENT OF BODY ACTION

MONTREAL, July 27.—(By The Canadian Press)—Normal individuals use the brain to govern 10 per cent of their actions, the other 90 per cent are controlled by the emotions, believes Dr. E. C. Menzies, assistant medical superintendent of Verdun Protestant Hospital. "We use our feelings to guard ourselves from truths we do not care to admit and in the procedure our judgment is warped," he said.

Every person has a tendency to wobble from the standard known as normal. Some guard their feelings carefully, staying in the world as we know it; others allow their intellects to build up illogical beliefs, the medico-psychologist said.

The subject of mental work includes everyone, for "all of us are not completely there. Those persons ticked 'out of their heads' do not form a group apart. Humanity, however, can be put on a scale where individuals can be graduated as 'all out' or 'least off.' The percentage of mentally disturbed able to go back to useful occupations after treatment compares favorably with surgical and medical cases," Dr. Menzies said.

—COURT NEWS—Mr. G. M. Matthews, Magistrate for Prince County, held Court at Summerside on Tuesday when several cases were heard. Mr. W. Henry Noonan prosecuted in all the cases. The first case was against a party from Kinkora, who had been charged with theft of under \$10. The accused pleaded guilty but was released under cognizance of \$500 under one surety for his good behaviour for two years. Mr. Heath Strong appeared for defendant. A man charged with selling liquor pleaded not guilty and was remanded to custody until Monday, August 1st. Three parties from Egmont Bay charged with unlawfully consuming liquor were found guilty and fined \$10 and costs or twenty days. A man from Baltic, who defended his own case, was charged with unlawful consumption of liquor and was fined \$10 and costs or twenty days. Two parties from Tignish on a similar charge were convicted and the same penalty inflicted. A party charged with illegal possession of liquor also from Tignish who pleaded guilty was convicted and fined \$200 and costs or three months. An adjourned case from the same place was disposed of, the accused being found guilty of possession and fined \$200 and costs or three months in jail. A case against a man from Kinkora charged with driving to the common danger came up. Witnesses for prosecution and defence were heard, and the case dismissed for want of evidence. Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., appeared for the defendant. The case against three juveniles from Summerside who were charged with theft from some summer cottages at McCallum's Point was adjourned until Monday next for the attendance of their parents. S.

Seeks Pension For Newfoundland Blind

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 27.—(By The Canadian Press)—F. E. Layton, known through Canada as the friend of the blind, was in St. John's recently to start a campaign to secure pensions for sightless people of Newfoundland. Addressing a meeting here, he urged his hearers to form a brotherhood. Such an organization, he said, would raise the economic status of the blind in the island dominion and give them better representation before any body before which they brought their problems. Mr. Layton, who founded the Canadian Federation of the Blind in 1926, outlined the objects of that organization. While advocating pensions for the blind, he does not believe in idleness. Blind himself, having lost his sight at the age of 13, in England, he came to Canada in 1887 and entered the piano manufacturing business. Today he is president of Layton Brothers. 100,000 TONS IN BLAST In one blast at the harbor board's quarry at Cobden, N. Z., recently 100,000 tons of stone were released.
