FIRE DESTROYS CHURCH AND HALL

CREW OF FOUR MEN DROWNED

LEWES, Del., July 23.—Four men are believed to have been drowned last evening by the sinking of the yacht Marketeer, in Delaware Bay. The men believed to be dead constitute the crew of the Marketeer. Late yesterday she grounded on Brandywine shoals during a storm.

The crew of four men were left on board to care for the vessel while the understanding was that a tug would be sent to take them off. The tug Genoa was communitated with, but when they arrived at the shoals, they found that the yacht had sunk. The keeper of the lighthouse notified the authorities that the last he saw of them was shortly before daybreak.

GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC ROUTE

Strong New Brunswick Delegation Urges the St. John River Valley Route.

OTTAWA, July 24.—(Special)—A strong New Brunswick delegation now here will see the Ministers tomorrow regarding the route of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

The distance is only seventeen miles in favor of the latter but they claim that superior grades on the valley route will more than counterbalance this and would assist greatly in the development of New Brunswick.

FOURTEEN CARS BURNED. HOULTON, Me., July 22.—The lumber mill, fourteen cars partly loaded with lumber, and the loading platform of the Fish River Lumber Co. at Eagle Lake Plantation, were totally destroyed by fire early yesterday. The total loss is estimated at \$80,000 on which there is an insurance of \$60,000.

FATAL QUARREL IN CAPE BRETON

St. PETERS, C. B. July 24.—(Special)—The settlement of Sea View seven miles from here was yesterday the scene of an affair which may result in the death of one of the parties involved and a charge of murder against another.

On Saturday night McDonald's horse broke into Mrs. Ferguson's field and Sunday morning McDonald sent his son Angus to bring the horse home.

McDonald assaulted young Ferguson with a stone and inflicted terrible wounds. Ferguson succeeded in dragging himself home and has since been unconscious.

ATTEMPT ON SULTAN'S LIFE

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 23.—Three commissioners are inquiring into the attempt on the life of the Sultan, Friday, but they have not yet been able to find the slightest clue to the author or the origin of the tragedy.

The killed included Bala Bey, tutor to the Sultan's sons. The majority of the victims were coachmen, and twenty-five hack coaches were blown to pieces, and fifty-five horses killed. A hole two yards wide was made in the ground by the explosion of the bomb.

The commission has ascertained that the explosion of the bomb caused the death of 24 persons and the wounding of 57 others. The investigations tend to show that the outrage was committed by two Hungarians.

BALFOUR WILL NOT RESIGN. LONDON, July 22.—It is understood that Premier Balfour has decided to remain in office until the end of the session, and to dissolve Parliament in October. No authoritative statement will be made until Monday.

DEATH LIST OF THE BENNINGTON

Is Less than First Reported—Fifty-eight Dead and Six More May Die Yet.

SAN DIEGO, CAL., July 24.—(Special)—A man connected with the gunboat Bennington disaster are now accounted for.

The result is fifty-eight dead, forty-six wounded, ninety-two uninjured and one deserted. Six of the wounded will probably die.

AUTOMOBILE RUN. LENOX, MASS., July 21.—With one exception all of the automobilists who are participating in the run from White Mountains to New York, had arrived here at 4.30 tonight. The only member of the party who had not put in an appearance at that hour was Mrs. Jean Cunes, of Richmond Hill, L. I., whose machine broke down about twenty miles from here. The start of the last day's run will be made early tomorrow forenoon.
