PARTY LINES.

A good deal of interest in other provinces than New Brunswick attaches to the election campaign now going on there, because of the principal question at issue. That question is, Shall the provincial government be run on party lines as known in Dominion affairs?

If we look for light in the experience of other countries we shall find in the United States that the party divisions in national affairs are carried down through the affairs of the states and the municipalities. Republicans and Democrats contend for the presidency, for seats in the national congress, for governorships of states and seats in the state legislatures, and for the mayoralty or councilorships in civic and municipal affairs.

Many party leaders prefer to have party lines drawn in everything because it assists greatly in keeping up the party organization. Dominion elections come only once in four or five years, with an occasional by-election between. If therefore the party organization is only to be used in federal affairs it becomes difficult to keep it up, and a new organization needs to be effected when each federal election comes round.

The questions which divide parties in federal affairs are entirely different from those of provincial and local affairs. For twenty years past a principal issue in Dominion politics has been the tariff and the merits of protection versus a tariff for revenue.

The extension of federal party lines into local affairs has, moreover, many serious disadvantages. There may be a Conservative administration

at Ottawa at the same time as a Liberal administration in the province, or vice versa. Then there must necessarily be a party antagonism between the federal and the provincial administration, which renders it exceedingly difficult for them to act together in any of the many public matters where concerted action is necessary and desirable.

Again, the party system greatly restricts in the choice of representative men whether for seats in the legislature or for provincial cabinet positions. Our provincial affairs are largely matters of municipal concern. Why might not an electoral district be left free to send to the legislature its best representative man, without regard to whether he happens to be a Liberal or a Conservative in federal politics?

It remains to be seen how the New Brunswick electors will decide the question at issue before them, but we shall not be surprised if they decide against the introduction of federal party politics in provincial affairs.

His View of it.

A Maori chief who lost £40 through a white storekeeper going through the Bankruptcy Court has given the following lucid exposition of this particular branch of British jurisprudence: "The pakeha (white man) who wants to become pakeharapu (insolvent) goes into business and gets lots of goods, and does not pay for them. He then gets all the money he can together, say £2,000, and puts all of it, except £5 away, where no one can find it. With the £5 he goes to a Judge of the court, and tells him he wants to become pakeharapu. The judge then calls all the lawyers together, likewise all the men to whom the pakeha owes money and he says, 'This man is Pakeharapu, but he wishes to give you all that he has got, and so he has asked me to divide this £5 amongst you all.' The judge thereupon gives the lawyers £4 and the remaining £1 to the other men. Then the pakeha goes home."

A comparison of cases of this anatomy has been attempted by two European anthropologists—the late Prof. Giacomini, of Turin, and M. Theophile Chodzinski, a recently deceased Polish assistant of Broca. The results seem to show beyond a doubt that the muscular systems of the white, the yellow and the black man differ in many features, and that the muscles of the white man are considerably better arranged for erect progression of the body and accurate use of the hands than those of the negro. In muscular anomalies especially the negro shows far more similar characteristics than the white man.
