Hints for the Motorist

STARTING THE CHILLED ENGINE

The following conditions are essential to the prompt starting of a cold engine. An explosive mixture must be present at the spark plug points, the ignition system must be at its best and the engine must be free to turn, so that a fair cranking speed can be obtained. Only a very small proportion of present-day gasoline will evaporate, and form an explosive mixture in a cold engine and thus a great excess of fuel must be supplied to the cylinders to obtain enough of the volatile constituent to produce explosions. Therefore, the carburetor may be flooded to insure plenty of fuel at the spraying jet, the air intake strainer or choke should be closed, as this causes liquid gasoline, with very little air to enter the manifold and prime the cylinders. If the carburetor has a dash adjustment, it should be set for a rich mixture. If this flooding with gasoline is objectionable in respect to its effect upon engine lubrication and should be carried no farther than absolutely necessary for it may defeat its purpose by choking the engine. The warmer the whole engine can be made before starting is attempted, the less of this flooding will be required for, at the higher temperature prevailing, a larger proportion of the gasoline will vaporize into an ignitable form. Heat can be supplied by the use in advance, of an under hood electric heater, by filling the cooling system with warm water; when anti-freeze is not in use, by using an electric radiator heater, by pouring hot water over the carburetor and intake piping that get into the air intake and by similar expedients. Excessive flooding with gasoline can also be avoided by priming each cylinder through its cock or spark plug hole with a respectful quantity of other gasoline mixture, thus provid-

ing an explosive mixture right at the ignition point, also by the use of a manifold suction or plunger primer, which delivers finely atomized or electrically heated gasoline or gasoline-ether mixture close to the intake valves. Some cars have electrically heated carburetor jets, which serve a similar purpose. In general the throttle should be open but little, as fuel is then more finely sprayed than at wide throttle openings.

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THE MARKET

MONTREAL, January 12.—The local egg market was without any new feature to note today. The demand for supplies for home consumption continues good and a fairly active trade was done in a jobbing way. Supplies of new laid eggs are coming forward a little more liberally, which are meeting with a ready sale and the bulk of the business in them is being done at 90c per dozen. The receipts today were 250 cases, as against 1,623 for the corresponding day a year ago.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: New laid eggs, 90c to 95c; Fall fresh eggs, 80c to 85c; Selected C. S. eggs, 80c to 85c; No. 1 C. S. eggs, 70c to 75c; No. 2 C. S. eggs, 55c to 58c. There was no marked change in the dressed poultry situation today, prices for all lines being steady. The demand was better for turkeys and chickens and a fair trade was done, but the movement of other lines was somewhat quiet. The receipts were not large, but the offerings were sufficient to meet all wants.

Smoke T&B A rich Virginia blend—cool smoking

prices as follows: Turkey, choice, 52c to 53c; Good turkeys, 50c to 51c; Geese, 30c to 35c; Chickens, 30c to 33c; Ducks, 30c to 32c; Fowls, 26c to 32c.

A fair trade was done in potatoes today, and, as the offerings were not in excess of the requirements, as steady feeling prevailed in the market with sales of car lots of Green Mountains and Quebec stock at \$1.60 to \$1.70 per bag of 50 lbs. ex-track, and in a wholesale jobbing way the movement was larger at \$1.75 to \$1.80 per bag of 50 lbs. ex-store.

NEW YORK, January 11.—Eggs, firm. Receipts, 8,833 cases. Fresh gathered, extra firsts, 70c to 71c; firsts, 68c to 69c; State Pennsylvania and nearby western henery, whites firsts, in extras, 72c to 77c; State, Pennsylvania, and nearby western henery browns, extras, 73c to 74c; do, gathered, browns and mixed colors, firsts to extras, 68c to 72c; refrigerator, firsts, 61c to 62c.

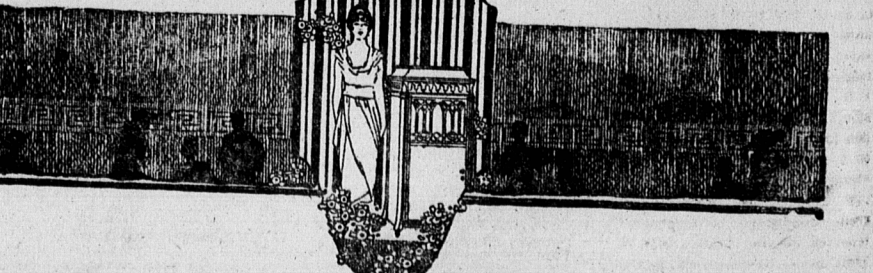
