Farm Notes

ANNUALS MAKE CUTTINGS

Many seed plants commonly found in home gardens are readily kept over the winter in the form of cuttings made at this time. They should be placed in moderately rich soil and set to make their growth in a good light, preferably sunlight after they are well rooted.

Encouraging thrifty stocky growth during the winter will develop material for spring cuttings to be rooted in time to go out into the garden next season.

Laying in a store of soil in the basement at this time is advisable that bulbs and other house plants may be certain of what ever earth they may require before spring.

Mature Wood Cuttings

Cuttings may be made now of black currant, gooseberry, lilac, willow, dogwood, poplar and Virginia's creeper to be laid away in a good covering of earth to callus in readiness for setting out in the early spring.

Such cuttings are usually tied in bundles for convenience sake. The bundles may be buried outdoors and well mulched or may be deeply covered with moist earth on the floor of a cellar or a root house, if spring is likely to be late.
