### German Chancellor Condemns Machinery For Effect On Soul

BERLIN, Aug. 23.—Chancellor Luther yesterday made public the text of an address which he had prepared for delivery before the Universal Christian conference at Stockholm, in which he pronounced the mechanization of modern economic life destroyed the soul of the individual worker.

The chancellor had hoped to address delegates personally but has been prevented from leaving Berlin.

Chancellor Luther, who is a lineal descendant of the great reformer Martin Luther, says in his address that with the introduction of modern machines, the individual artisan has lost personal contact with his work, and calling which has produced a spiritual void in the individual worker which practical Christianity should seek to overcome.

"The artisan of middle ages, the chancellor continues, rejoiced in his calling, because he was in much more intimate touch with it, whereas the worker of the present day is only expected to supply a few perfunctory manual movements. As a result, the chancellor believes the modern worker is spiritually famished and should be supplied with a source of ethical inspiration as an offset.

### Moncton Junior Council Gets Pond Removed

MONCTON, Aug. 23.—The reservoir at the corner of St. George street and Pacific avenue, will be drained and the city allowed use of the space for a dump until filled. This information has been given to the Junior Municipal Council by W. U. Appleton, general manager of the Atlantic Region of the Canadian National Railways.

The Junior Council took up the matter in the interests of public safety, their action resulting from the drowning accidents that have occurred there.

The statement of C. B. Allan, secretary of the New Brunswick Tourist and Resources' Association in the Telegraph-Journal to the effect that the association favored private ownership of tourist camp sites, as free municipal camp sites were likely to cut into the hotel business, has drawn a protest from Moncton's Junior Council. At a meeting of the council last evening, with Junior Mayor Karl Steeves presiding the matter was discussed. In the Junior Council's opinion tourists are induced to stay in Moncton as a result of the establishment of the camp site here. Otherwise they would go right through the city.

### Long River Notes

The Presbyterian congregation of Long River, which is one of the three sections of the New London Presbyterian Congregation, the three sections having voted separately to remain Presbyterian by substantial majorities, held a meeting last Tuesday the 18th instant to take steps for the calling of a minister. The necessary organization was completed and suitable committees were appointed for the purpose. Regrettably, as the meeting was about to adjourn a few of the former members who had left the church on the question of union, began a discussion on matters which had no relation to the purpose for which the meeting had been called. The chairman, Mr. Andrew McLeod, stated that the questions raised had already been settled by a vote of the congregation and he therefore closed the meeting with prayer. The intruders persisted in remaining and raised a heated dispute. The chairman stated that this unseemly conduct could not be tolerated in the church. Then Mr. D. Johnson, turned off the lights and the audience went out. Outside the wrangle continued till a late hour, the discussion frequently approaching belligerence but no blows were struck. It is to be regretted that in congregations where the question of union or anti-union was legally decided by an unquestioned vote some persons persist in trying to further disrupt congregations which are endeavoring to settle down to Christian activity and it is hoped the last has been heard of such godless methods.

MONTEAL, Aug. 24.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was again very dull, there being little or no demand from foreign buyers. There was some enquiry from New York exporters for No. 2 Canadian Western oats at 17 cents per bushel over the October option and for No. 3 grade at 9 1/4 cents per bushel over. C. I. F. Montreal but as there were none offering they could not fill their wants. Some ocean freight was booked to Rotterdam for heavy grain at ten cents per 100 pounds for August loading, and to London at 2s. 3d. plus 3s. 1/2, firsts 3s. 1/2, seconds 3s. 1/2 per quarter. There was some No. 2s F. O. F. cases returned. Montreal.
