Summerside Sees Good Racing.—Leeland F. Wins Class "B" and Barney Class "C"

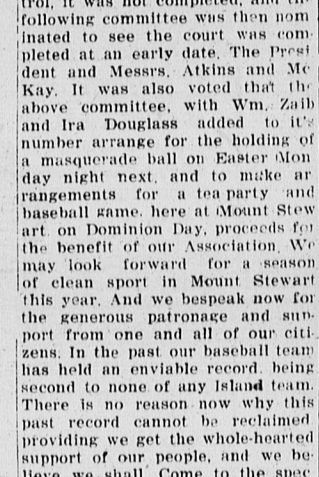

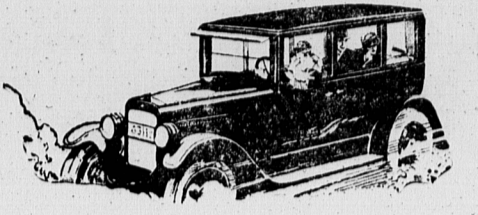

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)
 OTTAWA, March 13.—EGGS—Opinions seem to differ with regard to the Canadian situation and the imports of United States eggs and some dealers in Toronto and Montreal claim that local eggs are not yet sufficient to take care of the demand at the present time and the market is affected by an oversupply of United States eggs, too many having been bought at one time, but the situation is showing signs of clearing. The latest arrivals of United States eggs are costing about 32 1/2 delivered. Ontario shippers, yesterday were quoting extras 32 firsts 29, seconds 26 1/2. To these prices for Montreal, there must be added about 4c for express charges, Toronto unchanged. Montreal jobbing extras 37, firsts 34, seconds 32. Manitoba and Saskatchewan steady and unchanged. Edmonton firm, extras jobbing 46, firsts 44. Vancouver easy, extras costing delivered 29 firsts 27, jobbing extras 34, firsts 32, seconds 28.

MONTREAL, March 13.—There were very few orders in the local market here today for grain from the United Kingdom and continental buyers and in consequence the grade volume was small. The only sales reported were a few loads of low grade oats for March shipment. There was some demand for ocean grain, room and engagements to continental ports for March, April loading from west St. John and Portland were made for at 10 cents per 100 pounds and for Montreal at 14 cents per 100 pounds. For May shipment the local market for cash wheat was very weak and the dealers reduced the prices of oats another five cents per bushel.

There was enquiry from exporters for odd loads of Canadian Western No 2 Feed Grade and Sales were made at six cents per bushel, under the Winnipeg May option, c.i.f. hay ports, but the trade on spot was slow. Ontario No. 3 white was quoted at 25 cents and No 4 grade at 53 cents per bushel. On account of the pronounced weakness in Canadian cash wheat the local market for spring wheat grades of flour was easier and prices were reduced 40 cents per barrel, which makes a net reduction of \$1.20 per barrel to date. This month's prices for winter wheat flour scored a decline of 25 cents per barrel. Owing to the general reduction in flour prices, the mill-feed market displayed weakness and prices dropped \$2.00 per ton. Standard grades of rolled oats suffered another loss of 15 cents per bag. The egg market was active and steady. The demand for butter was limited, but the undertone was firm. The trade in cheese was inactive with folder made No 1 white and colored goods quoted at 20 1/4 to 20 1/2 cents per pound, and No 2 grade at 19 1/4 to 19 1/2 cents per pound. Beans were steady at \$2.70 per bushel.
