Doubtless most of us think ourselves quite superior to the Chinese, but they are the oldest nation in the world and had a high civilisation when our British ancestors were not only heathen, but savage barbarians. And there are today almost as many Chinese in their own country as there are of the white, yellow and black races in the entire British Empire. They whom we think of as heathen have their virtues and their vices as we have. Whether the Christian nations have treated the heathen peoples better or worse than the heathen have treated us, if judged by our own best standards and historic records, may be worth thinking over. "But at the balance let's be mute."

If the Chinese in Canada make our National Birthday a day of mourning, we may very well treat it lightly as a bit of Oriental sarcasm. We cannot seriously resent it. For those whose memories go back something less than sixty years can recall the time when in a Province near at hand scores of good Bluenose patriots painted the chimneys of their homesteads black and kept them so long after the first Dominion Day! And in the first Parliament did not Joseph Howe, chief orator of the malcontent "Anties" proclaim in stentorian tones that his fellow country men had been "sold for eighty cents a head—the price of a sheep skin?" He did. We heard him say it.

The Chinese notion of making Dominion Day a day of mourning is not even new. It is older than wireless telegraphy, flying machines, motor cars, telephones and most of our modern wonders. It is one of those first things in our Dominion history. Wherefore let our Oriental brethren celebrate their Day of Mourning, "alloe same one Bluenose Mellican man!"
