The circumstances under which this hymn originated are of more than ordinary interest. It was while making his famous tour in Scotland some years in the seventies with Mr. Moody that Mr. Shankey composed this popular song. The object of the meeting to be held next day in one of the best halls or churches belonging to the Presbyterian Church, in Edinburgh was the Good Shepherd and as Mr. Shankey was riding in a car on the railway he read a newspaper account of a Shepherd and his Sheep. At the meeting the next day after the famous evangelist Dr. H. C. Bonar had spoken, Mr. Moody asked Mr. Shankey for an appropriate hymn. Mr. Shankey at once thought of the newspaper verses and placing the little clipping before him on the organ began to improvise the music which he had finished a large part of the audience was in tears. It is said that over 50,000,000 copies of Mr. Shankey's "Gospel Hymns" alone have been printed.
