GENERAL CONDITIONS

The 2 Year Old Futurity will be raced on 2 in 3 plan. All other races to be on the three-heat plan with the following exceptions: — 10 per cent each purse will be awarded the winner. The remainder will be divided into three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of their being three heat winners they shall have a fourth heat to determine the winner. Any horse winning the first two heats in any race shall relinquish his pole position and assume last scoring position in the race.

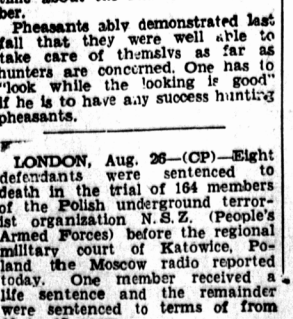
