Louis Scores Technical Knockout Over Paulino Uzcudun In Fourth Round

By Guardian's Special Wire) MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Dec. 13.—With the fire and only earnestly-placed punch of the entire abbreviated performance—a crushing right hook to the side of the face—Joe Louis exploded the remnants of the one-time rock-ribbed resistance of Paulino Uzcudun tonight and stopped the paunchy, 36 year old Spaniard for the first time in his career.

Right Hook To Side Of Face Forces Veteran Spanish Fighter To Quit. Capacity Crowd In Attendance.

On the floor for the first time in his life, Paulino staggered to his feet at the count of eight but was helpless, groggy and bleeding. He absorbed one more right to the head, wavered toward the ropes and looked helplessly at Referee Arthur Donovan, who promptly called a halt.

It was this cut that caused the blood to spurt from the Spaniard's mouth as he staggered to his feet and contributed to the referee's decision to stop the bout before any further and more serious harm was done to the old warrior.

It was no much of a fight, despite the fact Louis fully justified the predictions of his backers that he would "crack the uncrackable" and demolish the Spaniard's powers of resistance which most of the better known heavyweights of the past decade have failed to penetrate.

Long past his prime and no match for the slugging young negro, Paulino put up a game but feeble resistance. The broad-beamed Basque had been beaten before, but this was the first time he had been knocked down or stopped from going the limit.
