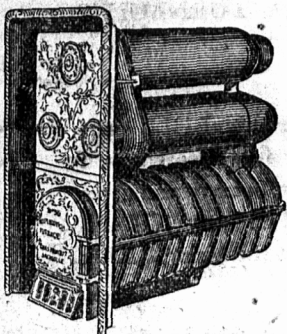

**French Stadium
Dedicated With
Athletic Meet**

PARIS, Oct. 26.—One more new stadium has been opened in Paris for track field and football. It is situated in the Auteuil district and was dedicated to the memory of the late John Bouin, who was one of the world's greatest athletes and one of those who were killed while fighting for their beloved France.

The beautiful stadium was dedicated recently with an international athletic meet, which had entries from six European countries. One of the visiting athletes was Van den Berg, champion sprinter of Holland, who accounted for the 100 and 200 meter sprints in the times of 10 4-5 and 22 seconds, defeating in both events Mourlon, the French champion and the German speedster Houben.

One of the feature events was the Prix Jean Bouin of 5,000 meters which was won by Eklof, of Sweden in 15 minutes and 24 seconds. The 1000 meter race was second three seconds slower.

The meet was a two-day affair, and on the second day the crowd was so great that the gates had to be closed shortly after the start of the first event, and hundreds would-be customers had to be turned away. France is certainly a sport mad.

**Stirling To Be
Instructor at "Y"**

ST. JOHN, Oct. 26.—W. E. (Ernie) Stirling, former distance runner and well known in sport circles throughout the country, has announced that he had resumed the position of athletic instructor at the Y. M. C. I. here, and as a consequence an active season is anticipated in the floors of the local gymnasium. "Ernie" was instructor at the Institute, following on the heels of "Joe" McNamara, of Boston. He held the position for four years, but about two years ago relinquished it and now is returning. A start was made last evening when ladies' classes were commenced and in a few days a comprehensive program for the season will be announced. The Y. M. C. I. this season was expected to make a good showing in basketball as its colors would be carried by teams in the intermediate and junior leagues and a house league also would be organized, it was said. Indications also point to the formation of an inter-society league this year and it was said that the floors of the Y. M. C. I. would be in great demand for the various games expected to be held there.

Mr. Stirling, who recently resigned the position of vice-president for New Brunswick of the M. P. B. of the A. A. U. of C., to take charge of the afternoon periods for the school boys and girls. He is at the present time getting the St. Vincent's High School basketball team in shape for the opening of the inter-societal league.

This season the boys and girls of the Institute will use the same gymnasium, but at different periods.

Pittsburg in 1927**

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 26.—Owen J. (Donie) Bush, manager of the Indianapolis American Association Baseball Club, has signed a one-year contract to pilot the Pittsburg Nationals in 1927, Pirate officials announced tonight.

Bush will succeed Bill McKechnie who was informed last week by President Barney Dreyfuss that his services would no longer be required. Pirate followers at the time expressed the opinion that McKechnie's discharge was an outgrowth of internal dissension in the ranks of the world's champions of 1925. In announcing Bush's appointment Sam Dreyfuss, treasurer of the Pittsburg Club said that the contract covered only one season.

**Stands Off Great
1926 Onslaught**

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 26.—The
youngest and yet the oldest pugilist-
ic champion of the world—such is
fidel La Barba, Los Angeles fly-
weight.

La Barba has just turned 21,
making him the youngest mitt
slinger—in number of years—to sit
on a world throne.

But he has held his title for one
year and two months, making him
the oldest champion—in period of
reign—to wear a boxing crown.

Since La Barba lifted the burdens
of being flyweight champion from
Frankie Genaro's shoulders in Au-
gust, 1925, the title in every other
recognized division has changed
hands.

Dempsey's Fall
The great Jack Dempsey, cham-
pion of all champions, has fallen
into disrepute, while handsome Gene
Tunney, fighting marine, rules the
heavyweights. Jack Delaney shoved
Paul Berlenbach out of the lime-
light and now wears the crown of
the light heavyweights.

The infallible Harry Greb, who
defied all rules of boxing and was
still unbeatable, finally succumbed
before Tiger Flowers, the Georgia
descon.

Mickey Walker, fighting little Ir-
ishman, who was often spoken of
as a "junior" Dempsey, reached the
end of his reign when he met Pete
Lazio, Pennsylvania's mining boy.

Pinky Mitchell, junior, welter
champ was decisively beaten by
Jackie Callahan, Los Angeles new-
boy, just two nights before the
great Jack took his pummeling.
Jimmy Goodrich, crowned light-
weight champ by the New York
boxing commission, fell before the
onslaught of veteran Rocky Kan-
sas. And Kansas' reign was short,
as he was unable to cope with the
class showed by Sammy Mandell in
their titular bout last June.

JOB PROTUM**

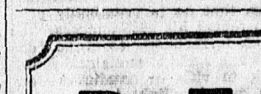
S. F. Doyle, president of the

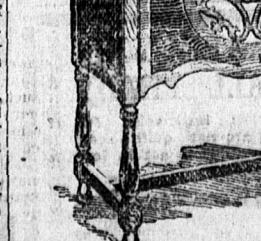
