TO CLEAR HECTOR MACDONALD'S NAME CARNEGIE OFFERS \$200,000

He Opens His Purse to Unmask What He Calls A Foul Cabal Against the Dead Hero of Paardeberg and Omdurman— He is Said to Have Private Information of A Plot Which Drove MacDonald to Suicide.

LONDON, [May 10.—Andrew Carnegie is coming out in an new role as a maker of history. He will attack the alleged British war office clique.

He has offered the sum of \$200,000, it is stated here, to secure certain evidence which will restore the character of Sir Hector MacDonald, the Scottish general who committed suicide at Paris, because of rumors affecting his honor as a British officer.

Mr. Carnegie takes this step because, as a Scotsman by birth, he believes that one of the most gallant generals his country has ever given to the King's service has been foully wronged by a despicable conspiracy.

Moreover, he believes that there is proof that the death of General MacDonald was due to a plot as base as anything known to history.

That the proof exists, the American millionaire has good reason to believe. Somebody in the war office, under the seal of confidence, has told him enough to make him morally certain of that. The only question is whether an outsider can get the proof.

Dr. Gowing Middleton, who examined the body of Sir Hector after the latter's awful death in Paris, is supposed to know a good deal that can be useful to MacDonald's friends.

In reply to the direct question whether he had been asked to help in the work of unmasking a war office intrigue, Dr. Middleton says that no offer was made to him in just that fashion.

"Was any offer made to you by Mr. Carnegie?" he was asked. "I prefer at this time to mention no names."

"Was any offer made to you?" "I think I may answer that without violating the rules of medical ethics. Yes, a proposition was made."

"What was its nature?" "Well, it was to follow up certain conditions, found in the autopsy."

"Favorable or unfavorable to the theory that the general had been wronged?" It may be to soon to say. But it might be said, I suppose, that the autopsy did not bear out the published and scandalous statements regarding Sir Hector."

"Was the offer made by any personal friend of the dead man?" "That is too much of a leading question. I prefer to say that a very generous offer was made by a rich American, looking towards the further elaboration of the results of the autopsy. Further than that I prefer to say absolutely nothing at this time. It would be decidedly premature."

No recent event has stirred up prominent people of Scotland more than the tragic story of the way in which General MacDonald, as they believe was hounded to death.

One of the general's most intimate friends says that he gave no serious thought to the charges against him until it was suddenly made clear to him that the British war office itself was about to make a public statement, intimating that the charges were true.

General MacDonald had no political influence. He was made to believe that if the war office condemned him no living man could believe him innocent. His protests of innocence were met at the war office with the coldest and stoniest silence, or open contempt.

He felt there their was no appeal. That the great steel king is ready to pour out his money like water to prove MacDonald's innocence, Carnegie has assured many of his more prominent countrymen, who have pleaded with him to undertake the task of restoring the honor of the dead general.

The only reservation made by Mr. Carnegie is that others must stand the brunt of the public work. He is willing to furnish the funds for his novel campaign. But he is now an American citizen, and General MacDonald's public defence must be voiced by subjects of King Edward.

Mr. Carnegie believes that the enmity of English officers did not end with MacDonald's death.

It seems now that the general's widow had promised his friends to allow a public funeral, at which Scotsmen might make some demonstration to show their belief in the general's innocence.

Here again the war office interfered, and the widow was coaxed and threatened until she allowed the newspapers to announce that the plans for the public funeral had been countermanded.

From his correspondence, it can be shown that when MacDonald started home he had no intention of doing anything desperate. He did not believe that the charges against him were worth any worry, hardly worth a second thought.

That he was in any way smirched by anything he had done, did not enter his mind for a moment, so far as his letters show. He felt able to disprove anything that had been said against him.

The only thing that changed him from a self-respecting man to a despairing wretch must have been something done or said by his superiors in the army. What that was the public does not know, but Carnegie's offers of money for proof as to his innocence may yet bring out the facts.

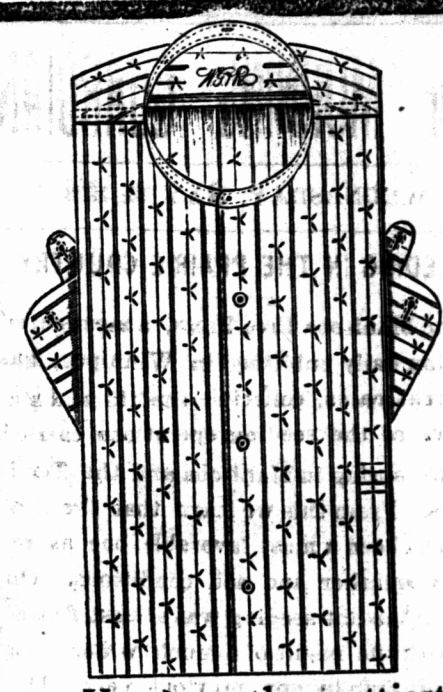
