Oppressive Taxation Cause of Canada's Troubles

The following article by Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen appears in the April 18th issue of "Marketing," a Canadian Business Magazine published in Toronto:

The burden of taxation may be lightened in two ways. By the reduction of expenditure and by the application of a policy which through stimulating industry will enable those who pay taxes to do so more easily. To-day taxation is oppressive because it has increased out of all proportion to the increase in the volume of business.

The aggregate of governmental expenditure can and must be reduced. This is the only basis on which a reduction in taxation can be made possible. We have made an immense capital investment in public works and enterprises generally, which should now be increasingly utilized to yield a return. This, rather than the making of heavy

new commitments, is the end to which our efforts should be directed. As a people we shall have to learn to do without some things for a while. We cannot eat our cake in the form of new expenditure, and have it too in the form of reduced taxation.

Canadian industry requires steady and dependable encouragement. Under the pressure of war conditions it did remarkable things, but unstable fiscal policy and heavy taxation have greatly retarded its development with the result that it is still far behind that of other countries. The creation of industries based upon them. In this way larger employment will be found for capital and increased work and wages provided.

BEST MARKET AT HOME

There must be a greater appreciation of the home market. Just now thought is centered too much on the export trade. Of course this is very important, but the best market is that which exists at home. It is this that is slipping away from us. Industry is depressed because the home market languishes, and no wonder. We are only getting about one-third of the number of immigrants during the course of the year that we got ten years ago, and we are losing a far greater percentage of our native born.

With this stimulating of our industrial life there must be a readjustment of taxation. This is absolutely necessary before industry can secure the relief necessary to its recovery. During the stress of the war's demands, when much additional revenue had to be provided quickly, new taxes were imposed, through the gradual return of normal conditions, have been rendered too onerous. These new taxes have in recent years been increased and the burden has become insupportable. The United States has recognized these things and in addition to protecting strongly its home market that country has been reducing expenditure and taxation with a ruthless hand. The freeing of American industry through the lightening of the load of taxation is a condition we must recognize. Canadian industry must be similarly freed.

There should be at the earliest date possible an appreciable reduction in the income tax. It is too much to expect our people on this

Msgr. Deschamps Becomes Bishop By Consecration

MONTREAL, April 24.—St. James Roman Catholic Cathedral today was thronged by a distinguished congregation of public men and prelates from all over the country who attended the consecration of Monsignor Alphonse Deschamps as titular Bishop of Thennes and auxiliary Bishop of Montreal. Mgr. Georges Gauthier, archbishop coadjutor of Montreal, administered the consecration, assisted by Bishop Forbes, of Joliette and Mgr. Gagnon, Bishop Auxiliary of Sherbrooke. The basilica was filled when Mgr. Piero di Maria, apostolic delegate, took the Throne attended by Father Labelle, Superior of the order of St. Sulpice and Father Philatrat of the Jesuit order.

The ceremony was solemn and colorful as two by two the hundreds of priests, veils and bishops, followed by the papal delegate, entered and took their places in the sanctuary to the accompaniment of the Pontifical March, which was immediately followed by an anthem.

The consecration was preceded by a number of ancient interrogations put to the bishop-elect by Archbishop Gauthier, the archbishops celebrated mass, drinking from the same chalice in accordance with the rite. A sermon by Bishop Langlois of Quebec followed, after which the newly consecrated Bishop administered the benediction to members of his family present.

side of the boundary line to pay an income tax which, because of United States reductions, has become far in excess of that paid on the other side. The first thing we know the handicap will be even greater, it being practically certain that this year Congress will reduce the surtaxes still further. The danger to us of the loss of population and capital is too great. It is out of the question for Canada to maintain a much higher income tax than exists in the United States.

MUST SCALE SALES TAX DOWN

The sales tax must also gradually be scaled down until it disappears. While warranted as a war measure, it must be recognized that it bears heavily both upon consumption and production. In proportion as it is heavy the consumer pays more and as it cannot always be passed on, it is a handicap both on the manufacturer and distributor. Stamp taxes are also a handicap both on primary production and on business and should be removed as soon as possible.

It is inevitable that the foregoing taxes must gradually be reduced, for whether the tax on taxation methods in this country will approximate to those employed by our great neighbor. But the huge interest charged on the national debt and the heavy payment for pensions and other war liabilities make it necessary that large revenues be raised. This means that greater use must be made of the customs tariff to produce revenue. In this way the argument for the tariff is made doubly strong.

In conclusion, this country must live within its income, and it will produce a surplus which will enable it to reduce its national debt. We are now and have been for years adding constantly and heavily to that debt. We must not only make up our minds to spend less, industry must be stimulated that it may recover its old-time vigour; and with this must go a lightening of taxation such as will enable Canada to hold her own in the keen battle for home trade and world trade which is now upon us.

Ontario Borrows \$20,000,000

TORONTO, April 24.—According to his new system of refunding loans, Hon. W. H. Price is today issuing a call for tenders for twenty million dollars, for one and two years, to meet obligations in New York. He is taking advantage of the low rates for short-term money. The funds are to be used entirely for refunding purposes. The Treasurer was recently in New York arranging details of the payment of maturing debts.

Unique Pension Case

TORONTO, April 24.—An outstanding case, in which a widow and two children were left in severe financial straits by the death of the husband and father by suicide has been brought to a satisfactory conclusion by Harry Bray, of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, who has obtained a pension for the widow and children.

Early in May, 1922, a returned soldier was admitted into the West-ern hospital and died within 20 minutes from poisoning, following the taking of carbolic acid. The problem which confronted his dependents was to connect his suicide with his war service.

Various organizations, with considerable local advice, were used by the widow to fight her almost hopeless case, but with no success. Finally she consulted Mr. Bray, who perused the man's records very thoroughly.

Due to War Service.

From them he learned that the deceased had suffered severe shell shock whilst in France, following which there was a continual evidence of mental weakness. Pension was refused by the Board of Pension Commissioners, and appeal was entered with the Federal Appeal Board. Following the authenticated evidence of Mr. Bray, the widow and children were allowed a pension.

This case was considered one of the hardest to bring to a satisfactory conclusion, and is unique in the Dominion of Canada.

Air Pullmans Next

CHICAGO, April 24.—Plans for the construction by the Pullman Company at Pullman, Ill., of fleets of all-pullman airplanes for service in transcontinental commercial flights, have been revealed by the chief engineer of the company. It has been decided, he said, to operate the planes along the same lines as pullman sleepers are used in railroad traffic. The Pullman Company would lease its ships to operators who would contract to maintain service. The craft would be operated by pilots of leasing concerns.

The aircraft would be intended primarily for long overnight hops, such as from New York to Chicago, it was said.

Last Wish Refused

PARIS, April 24.—An executioner avowed Laudies Ladtar, an Arab convicted of murdering two Portuguese and wounding three others, from a sound sleep in La Sante death house this morning and bade him farewell for the guillotine which was waiting.

Extending the usual cigarette and glass of rum, the warden asked the condemned man "what is your last wish?" The condemned Arab replied, "I wish not to be executed." The guillotine knife fell at 5.45 o'clock.

Greek Girls Inveigled to U. S. by "Picture Bride" Expedient

WASHINGTON, April 24.—The State Department and Immigration authorities are casting about for a method of breaking up a process of bringing Greek girls into the United States through the "picture bride" expedient.

According to a complaint on file at the State Department one firm of New York lawyers has now on deposit \$200,000, representing advance payments for importing these brides, everyone comes in under contract.

While in most of the cases that have come to the knowledge of the American and Canadian authorities there is a bona fide marriage, arranged generally by the parents of a Greek here and a girl abroad, they suspect that the process is being generally employed to get around the immigration restrictions.

Under the law, American consuls are required to vize the passports of the wives of American citizens. The method is to bring the girl to Canada. There she is joined by an American citizen and the marriage ceremony is performed.

Commissioner General Husband said today that a great many women had come in under non-quota provision of law. American consuls had found that these young Greeks have been using her as a football to bring in their brides-to-be and shut off on it," said he. "We would not permit any foreigners to use the United States as a bridge to get into Canada. Canada has refused to be used that way. We have had information of a few instances where young fellows paid dearly in lawyers' fees to get the Canadian Government to change its decisions in their favor, who had about \$8,000 and then lost their brides, the Canadian Government having deported them."

Gross Earnings Of The C. N. R.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, April 24.—The gross earnings of the Canadian National Railways for the week ending April 21, 1925, have been \$3,870,419, a decrease of \$407,269 over corresponding week in 1924. Gross earnings of the system from January 1st to April 21st, 1925 has been \$63,339,837, a decrease of \$6,536,566 as compared with the corresponding period of last year.

Sees New York Half Mile High

NEW YORK, April 24.—H. W. Corbett, president of the Architectural League of New York, before the architectural and allied arts exposition, said that New York, of 60 years hence will be a titanic city half a mile high, 75 miles long and 50 miles wide.

"All automobile traffic will disappear from the surface or through-tubes," said Mr. Corbett, with traffic moving through tubes, movable platforms and escalating galleries. People will be shot through tubes 50 miles long in 30 minutes."

Drunken Firemen In Fury Kills Old Man

NEW YORK, April 24.—Hugh McSweeney, 35 years old, a fireman of hook and ladder company while intoxicated, sought Henry Stern, who had sold him a furnished house at Rockaway Park, because some furniture was missing when he took possession. Unable to find Stern, McSweeney in a drunken fury, according to the police, beat to death a 70-year old man, and was endeavoring to choke a 77-year-old woman when overcome by the combined efforts of a neighbor, armed with a broom stick, a plumber and a policeman.

Gold Rush Begins To Quebec Section

PEMBROKE, Ont., April 24.—Gold has been discovered at Cobb Lake, Pontiac county, Quebec eight miles from Chapeau and about 15 miles from here. It became known today. Claims have already been staked out in all directions and there is considerable excitement in the district over the discovery. The ore, when assayed, gave gold to the value of \$38 to the ton, it is stated. A considerable rush to the district is in prospect according to news reaching here from Chapeau.
