Two Addresses to Rev. John McDonald

The Parishioners of Kinkora and the C. M. B. A. Make Presentations.

On the eve of his departure from Kinkora, where he had labored for twenty-nine years, to take charge of St. Paul's parish, Summerside, Rev. John J. McDonald was waited upon by a committee representing the parishioners of Kinkora and was presented with a well filled purse and an address. The C. M. B. A. of Kinkora also presented him with a beautiful reading lamp and a fire screen. The ladies of the parish also remembered Father McDonald and Father McIntyre with gifts of linen.

The address from the parishioners of Kinkora is as follows:

Rev. J. J. McDonald, Rev. and very dear Father:

When, two weeks ago today, you confirmed the current tidings that, in obedience to the voice of God, you were soon to sever your connections with the parishioners of Kinkora, and continue your sacred duties elsewhere, our hearts throbbled with sorrow, for at that moment we felt as if the soul of our parish had disappeared. Turning back through the lapse of time, we recall to mind that, twenty-nine years ago today, you celebrated your first Mass in Kinkora as Parish Priest. Many who on that day assisted at the Holy Sacrifice, have since passed away; many more, then but children, received their early instructions from your fatherly voice and have since grown to manhood.

A moment's pause for reflection and a glance at the staleness and grandeur of our church and surroundings; compare them with those which met our view thirty years ago, and we soon see the great changes that have taken place, changes wrought by your tireless energy and constant work. Our old church you removed and remodelled into a pleasant, spacious hall, and on its foundations your rear-od a grander, nobler edifice, the one in which we have ever taken a just pride. Our country you extended and beautified, making it a fit resting place for our beloved and honored dead. To the parochial house and lawn you were ever adding your tinge of beauty, keeping them neat and tidy; a tribute of respect to the Lord who dwelleth near and a mark of admiration to the passersby.

But not to these alone did you confine your influence and energy. You always have taken a special pride in endeavoring to promote our temporal interests and welfare. You were largely instrumental in having work at Kinkora the cheese factory which has been such a great boon to us. In

all lines of advanced farming and industrial activity you have taken a leading part; in short it was your constant endeavor to make our parish a better and more beautiful place to live in. Yes, dear Father, you worked faithfully to help us on temporarily, but your great virtues as a priest exceed all your other qualities. Ever solicitous for the spiritual welfare of each and every member of your flock, your most cherished desire was to lead us, ever onward and upward. Your ardent zeal for the promotion of greater glory and honour to God, your boundless wealth of charity, your cheerfulness at any hour in visiting the sick and giving consolation to the dying; all this is deeply imprinted on the Heart of Him who generously rewards even the cup of cold water given in His name.

Yes, your years made, given cheerfully, unselfishly. Your noble character will be an undying example for us and your calm countenance will ever be a sweet memory of the past. Never can we repay your many acts of kindness, but daily in our humble prayers, we shall ask Almighty God to bless you and allow you many more years in His service.

Kindly accept this little gift as a small token of our deep love and sincere gratitude.

And now, dear Father John, our eyes grow dim with mist as the time draws near to say farewell.

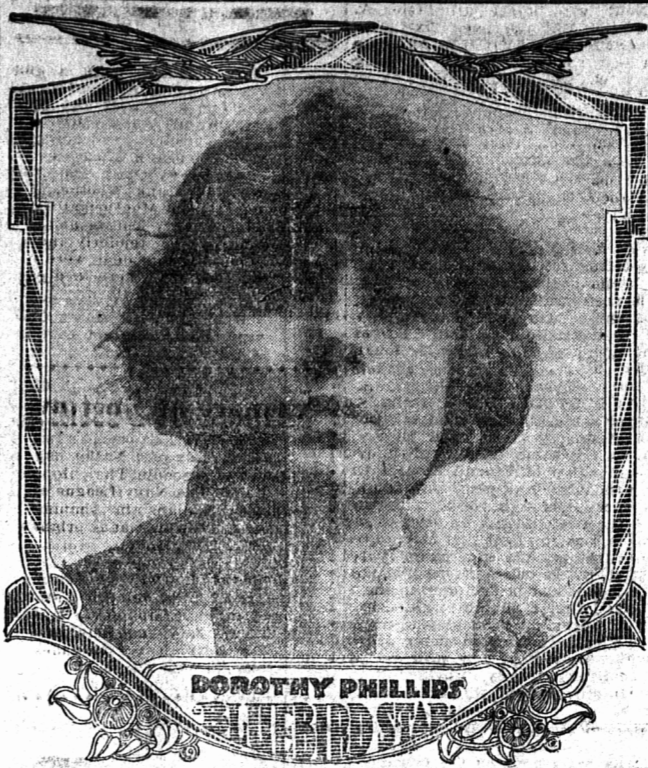
