TO UPHOLD THE PROHIBITORY LAW.

We beg to direct attention to the letter of Watchman, which appears in another column of this issue of The Guardian. We do so the more earnestly because in other sections of the Province farther east than Brudenell and farther west than Emerald like conditions prevail. It seems a great pity that with the good law we have there should be, here and there a considerable illegal sale of liquor. This is partly due to the weakness of temperance sentiment in certain localities, and partly to inefficient prosecutors, or such as are not in sympathy with the law.

It is notorious that a careless, indifferent or hostile prosecutor—we mean one hostile to the law—possesses the power to render the law of no effect within his jurisdiction. It is easy for a prosecutor to lose every case he takes to court. It is hard enough with a clear case to get a conviction, even if the prosecutor is capable and does his best. Where the prosecutor is incapable, or not in earnest, or worse still, where he is only going through the form of prosecution occasionally to save appearances, and does not desire a conviction, there is an inevitable failure of justice. Worse still, the guilty liquor seller is given an acquittal covering a three months period. He may thus, by undergoing a harmless form of trial four times in the year, secure immunity from punishment after breaking the law, week day and Sunday for twelve months.

These remarks are not intended to apply to the prosecutors in the district mentioned by Watchman. As to how they are performing their duty we have no recent information, but we know that our remarks are true as applied to certain other sections of the Province. There can be no hope for the safety of the flock where

the watch-dog is in league with the wolves. Those temperance people who find the prosecutors in their district notoriously inefficient, or playing into the enemy's hands, should storm the Government with delegations and protests till the delinquents are removed and replaced by better men. Where, as is the case in some parts, the prosecutor is merely inactive, the zeal and sympathy of earnest temperance workers can do much toward encouraging him to greater activity. The office of prosecutor, is at best an unthankful one, and is doubly so where the sympathy of the temperance people is withheld, or unexpressed.

We think there has been in some sections of the Province a lack of sympathy and support for the honest prosecutor. Pastors, individual temperance men, churches, temperance divisions and lodges can aid powerfully in promoting and supporting the enforcement of the law. Here in Charlottetown once the stronghold of the liquor trade in the Province and by far the hardest spot in which to enforce the law, it has been enforced in admirable fashion, considering the prospects as they were nine years ago. This has been due to the services of an earnest and efficient prosecutor, backed up by a body of zealous and faithful men who have given of their time and money without stint to make this a sober city. It is beyond question the soberest and most orderly city of its size in Canada today. What has been done in Charlottetown, under hard conditions, should stimulate our temperance friends in the country districts to renewed and persistent efforts to secure a complete enforcement of the law. If a strenuous effort be made it will have its reward.

CARUSO PROTECTED BY ARMED GUARD.

NEW YORK, March 15.—Enrico Caruso, the tenor, created a furore in Brooklyn today by appearing at the district attorney's office conveyed by a heavily armed guard of seven fellow countrymen, who had escorted him from his hotel in Manhattan. Caruso swore to the warrants charging the two Italians arrested last week with attempting to extort \$15,000 from him by black hand methods.

Caruso, who is said to have been greatly worried by the blackmailing threats against him, refused to go to the police court, which is in a foreign settlement of Brooklyn, to make the complaints and the magistrate met him at the prosecutor's office. Later the two men prisoners were held in \$5,000 bail each for a hearing next Wednesday.

TO STOP SUNDAY LABOR.

WELLAND, Ont., March 15.—The Welland Ministerial Association will ask the Attorney-General's Department to stop unnecessary Sunday labor in Welland and vicinity. The association will just call attention to the situation in a general way, and then it is the duty of the Attorney-General to look into the matter. The association first made complaint to the Lord's Day Alliance, but no relief came from that quarter. The ministers have received several complaints from workmen in Welland who dare not object openly.

BIG MINE ON FIRE AT STELLARTON, N. S.

HALIFAX, March 16.—The Acadia Coal Company's mine at Stellarton is on fire in the back slope, and the outlook is serious. There has been fire for some time in another of the company's slopes, overlying this one. It has now broken through into the back slope, and the whole mine is threatened.

Men are working in the slope as far down as the fire will permit. This is being done in the hope of cutting off the air and smothering it out.

LOST WARSHIP OFF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

VICTORIA, B. C., March 16.—There is a report from Uleleut, on the east coast of Vancouver Island, that one of the Whaling Company's steamers has discovered what may prove to be the wreck of the Condor, a British warship, lost with all hands in the winter of 1900. An investigation will be made.
