FOOD REFORM

Unfermented fruit juices are bound to come into their own. An interesting movement, receiving press notice was started in the city of Hamilton, Ont., last spring. The local milk dealers not only loaded their wagons with milk but added thereto a supply of orange juice and grape juice. This produced a reaction of a deputation of representatives of the firm handling the juices who waited on the local Board of Health to oppose the granting of permission to a certain dairy to sell these products from milk wagons.

The milk producers of the district had a grievance and charged that the sale of a chocolate milk drink by local dairies was reducing consumption of whole milk in Hamilton, and that this practice, coupled with the sale of fruit juices was creating a milk surplus for the Hamilton district producers.

Some forty years ago the W. C. T. U. sensed what was then called Food Reform. New Zealand was the first country to accept it as a W. C. T. U. Department. The World's W. C. T. U. adopted it also on the presentation of the following resolution:

"As it is now recognized that inebriety is continually the result of diseased conditions, produced in a large measure by injudicious and insufficient diet, it is resolved that a World's Food Reform Department be established to deal with all questions relating to food, and to use a scientific knowledge of the nature of food."

Miss May Yates, in her first World Superintendent Report of this department, made the far-sighted pronouncement:

banishing the craving for alcoholic stimulants is to supply these phosphates and acids in their natural condition, as found in grains, pulses, nuts, green vegetables, and above all in fresh, uncooked ripe fruit.

In the Hamilton incident a medical Alderman put the problem in these modern terms:

There are vitamins A, B, C and D now, and they would probably go on until X was reached, but I still believe that all that is needed for health is three square meals a day with milk, butter, meat, vegetables, and Canadian fruits."

In 1895 this department was adopted by the British Union with Miss Yates as National Superintendent, and she did much to encourage the more general use of the "kindly fruits of the earth."

There has been lingering in the imagination of the centuries an "elixir of life" for the purpose of prolonging life indefinitely, but now science has entered the race to achieve a lengthened physical life, with its senses intact, doubtless it will solve this problem to a large degree than the past record, being helped materially by the employment of a diet in which unfermented fruit juices will be prominent.

WHY THE "DEPRESSION."

Many troubles, financial and otherwise are man-made and not God-appointed as some are inclined to imagine. Not long ago, the press carried the news that the United States is smoking more cigarettes and that the 1935 production totalled 138,656,000,000. These figures are authoritative being provided last July by the commerce department, Washington, D. C. These figures compared with 1933, the last preceding census year, show the increase to be 23 per cent.

Both in Canada and the American Republic, the carelessness of cigarette smokers has caused endless fires and deaths. It was indeed a wise move for the International Fire Chiefs' Association, when they met last summer in Toronto, to pass a resolution condemning smoking in theatres. The discussion preceding the adoption of this

resolution pictured vividly that the hazards were trebled by the pandemonium produced to reach exits when an alarm was given.

As a matter of course, this resolution was opposed on the principle of "personal liberty." What did it matter that valuable lives were sacrificed, the moneyed interests of the tobacco trusts must not be imperilled? Per so on a interest was a mere subterfuge. The smoking habit has no reasonable excuse for continuance in modern conditions, and the resolution was passed.

BELIEVE IT OR NOT.

"During the year of 1935," says Robert Ripley in his newspaper column of curious things which he intitles "Believe it or not"—"the Keeley Institute of Dwight, Illinois, made a careful survey covering the background and occupations of the 782 patients treated for the disease of Alcoholism during the entire year. Of this number only one was a saloon-keeper."

Most of the other occupations seemed to be represented in the list. True, there were no ministers, listed, and no members of the teaching profession, a fact which does not seem to call for comment but "believe it or not," Mr. Ripley says, "saloonkeepers do NOT drink their own liquor."

Why not? Well whatever the real reason may be, the fact remains that they, at least, are under no delusion as to the benefits that alcoholic beverages bestow upon the devotees of drink. They are treated to practical demonstrations of the "value" of the alcohol habit, form every point of view—Union Signal.

PROFANE LANGUAGE

Language indicates character. "Every idle (pernicious) word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment. For by the words thou shalt be justified and by the words thou shalt be condemned." The prevalence of profane language is greatly to be deprecated. We can express ourselves clearly and strongly without it, and no person of high and pure character needs to speak it; yet it is used so frequently in conversation and in print, especially in stories and novels, and not only by degraded personalities, but by those who assume to be of high caste, that we may become accustomed to it and regard it as ordinary and innocent. Jesus never found it necessary to say more than "Yes" and "Nay," anything more he declared to be of the evil one.

Profanity may not only be expressed but implied as is often the case with the words "damn" and "damned." It may be said that they are used only to express condemnation or hatred, and not only in a profane sense; still it is often with implications that the words have their strength and significance, and the name of "God" is understood as being prefixed, and "damn you" does not mean human condemnation but God's curse. The English language has a wealth of words, many interfections for instance, without profane or sinister implication, and while it may be necessary to reproduce at times the bad language of others we have no need to make it our own.
