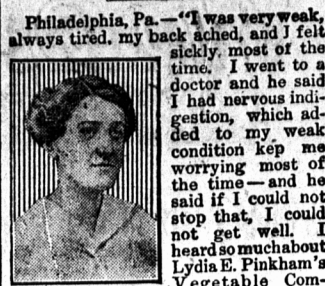

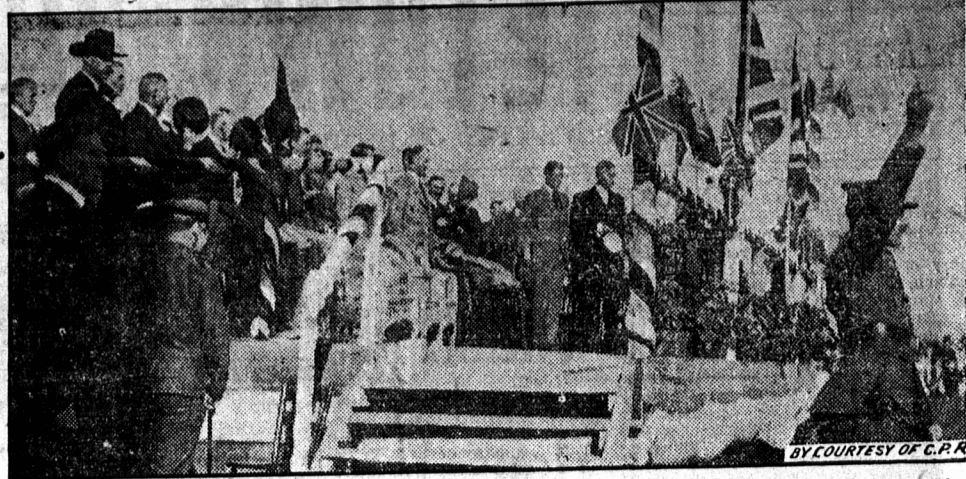

 previous record for five miles was

 Phillip Ha-Ha, owned and driven by
 C. Robillard, of Montreal, and he set
 the pace until the last half-mile when
 the Quebec mare went by him and
 won.

 the other by Miss Marble.

**REV. DR. PRINGLE'S FINE TRIBUTE
 TO BRITISH ARMIES**

ST. CATHERINE'S Ont., Sept. 28.—
 Rev. Dr. John Pringle, moderator
 of the Canadian Presbyterian Gen-
 eral Assembly, in an address here on
 the forward movement, paid a fine
 tribute to the armies of Great Britain,
 which he declared really won the war,
 in the glorious retreat from Mons.
 "The United States in giving its men
 General Foch to place where he wish-

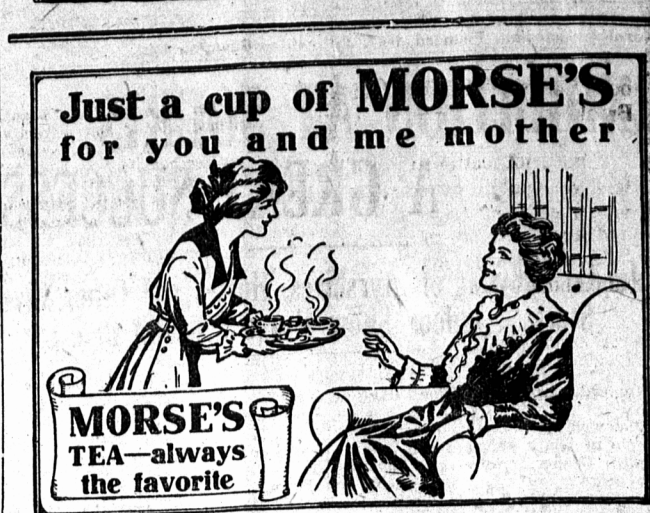
