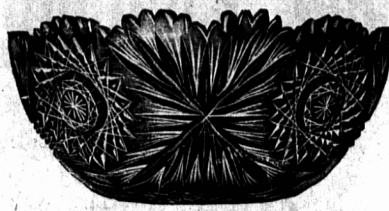

Dr. Barth, replying for the guests spoke of the responsibility of the press of both countries in uniting the two peoples, adding:—"Should there ever be war between Great Britain and Germany what would be the end of it? Neither country would be a penny the better for the enterprise, but on the contrary the whole of civilized Europe would suffer an enormous loss. Such a crime would also result in the abdication of Europe in favor of America, which thus would become the leader of the world."
