

Soviet Eyes on Mongolia

(Canadian Press)
SHANGHAI, Feb. 18.—The Russian soviet is reaching out for territory in Mongolia, according to reports reaching here from the north.

The authorities are now in control of Outer Mongolia have accepted a proposal from the Bolsheviks to make their country a self-governing state of the soviet republic. A secret agreement is said to have been entered into prior to Envoy M. Tharakan's departure for China. It stipulates that Outer Mongolia be placed under soviet protection and its government will invite Russians to organize laborers' and peasants' institutions; the abandonment of the rule of princes, government to be conducted by a revolutionary committee with the governor as chairman; Russian citizens of Mongolia to have the right to purchase land and exploit mines of Mongolia; railroads to be built by Russian engineers with only Russian capital; Russians to be permitted to organize labor and co-operative societies on the Russian plan, only Russian citizens to be employed in the service of the government "in order to show their sincere wish for the unification of the two countries."
