STANLEY SAILED

From S'ide to Pictou Last Night.

PEOPLE ARE INDIGNANT

Reasons Wired From Ottawa Not Pleasing—Good Work Done.

A great question which has been agitating the minds of the people of this Province and particularly the people of Summerside and Charlottetown through the past week or more has at last been settled; it would appear, for the present at least, that the Stanley has been ordered to the Georgetown-Pictou route and left Summerside at 5 p. m. for the latter place. The following telegram was received by the President of the Board of Trade from Sir Louis Davies:

R. C. McLeod, Summerside: Letter received. Begret impossible make promises suggested. Owing to absence of terminal facilities at Tormentine, combined with smallpox there Stanley is carrying little freight, through passengers and no mails. See no prospect her being much public service remainder of winter on this route while tremendous congestion of freight at Pictou demands her presence there to relieve it. To continue her on Summerside-Tormentine route under existing conditions probably materially damage that route. In public interest therefore have ordered her Pictou immediately. (Signed) L. H. DAVIES.

The following reply was forwarded:

Sir L. H. Davies, Ottawa: Board of Trade exceedingly regret that you deem it necessary in public interest to withdraw Stanley. In order to allay public indignation here please couple the withdrawal of Stanley with promise that the terminal facilities at Tormentine will be put in good condition next summer to ensure permanency of route. Wire reply. Urgent. (Signed) R. C. McLEOD, President S. S. Board Trade.

The above answer to the Board of Trade's demand has caused a great deal of disappointment in Summerside and was received with displeasure by many, but however, a great deal of good has been accomplished during her stay here which will be beneficial at the approach of next winter season. The Summerside-Cape Tormentine route has been proven feasible and after a trial of daily round trips for over one week under many disadvantages the steamer never was over two hours crossing from one point to the other. Thus Summerside has good grounds for demanding that everything be made ready during the coming summer to have the route established so that no hitch will occur in transferring mails, passengers and freight when winter sets in again.

PEOPLE in Summerside smiled yesterday when they read the announcement that the Minto would now bring the mails daily from Pictou. A sample of the daily mail was received at noon in the shape of papers and letters due here three days ago. The St. John Telegraph of the 1st inst. was received here at noon on the third and in Charlottetown on the evening of the 2nd and other important mail matter with similar despatch. By the Stanley they claim, and with the proof at hand in her record of the past 10 days, the St. John Telegraph of the 1st would be delivered in Summerside at 4 o'clock the same afternoon and in Charlottetown same evening, but the smile faded when the Stanley was seen steaming out of the harbor during the evening, heading for Pictou.
