A GOOD BEGINNING.—Hon Charles Dalton's new gasoline yacht, Irene, entered upon her career in a way which brought joy to the heart of her owner, her first act being to render assistance on Friday, The Irene, fully equipped for her voyage home, lay at the wharf waiting for favorable weather, as it was then blowing a gale. Mr. Dalton and Captain Paquet, who were on board were watching a tug towing a barge loaded with stone across the harbor. The heavy tow was too much for the tug and they were hopelessly drifting toward the rocky shore. The tug dropped anchor but she still drifted. Mr Dalton asked Captain Paquet if he thought the yacht could save the tow. The Captain answered "The Irene can pull anything ashore that's afloat and can weather any kind of a gale." Mr. Dalton at once told him to go to the rescue. The Irene's lines were cast off, she went like a rocket to the tug, got hold of the latter's bawser and pulled tug and barge to the Breakwater. The tug and barge are owned by Mr. Acorn and although the former might have cut loose from the barge and saved herself the barge and its load would certainly have been thrown up on the rocky shore had it not been for the timely help rendered by Mr. Dalton whose chief delight is to help others. It was a fitting baptism for the Irene.

OF SPECIAL INTEREST

PARIS, July 31.—(Special.)—Despatches from Portugal received by way of the Spanish frontier indicate that great revolutionary activity prevails in Portugal and it is reported that a past movement, originated in Lisbon and Oporto, may break out at any moment. From the same source it is reported that serious street fighting occurred last night in various places between the troops and the civilians. The censor in Lisbon refused to allow the cabling of an Associated Press despatch stating that a band of revolutionaries had attempted to rush the barracks of the Sixteenth infantry regiment in order to rescue the political prisoners detained there since the last outbreak. The civilians were repulsed by the troops after an exchange of shots with the guard.

PARIS, Aug. 2 (Special).—The Senate has ratified a new twenty-five year contract with the Compagnie Generale Trans-Atlantique, the French line, under which the company is exclusively sub-vented to carry the American mails.—It is reported that the company will undertake the construction of several immense steamships with which to compete with the other services.

ROME, Aug. 1 (Special).—Duchesse de Talleyrand, who was Anna Gould, of New York, in a letter written to the Giornale d'Italia concerning the decision rendered recently by the Rota Tribunal annulling her marriage to Comte Boni de Castellane, her first husband, says the decision was handed down without her knowledge or without her having a chance to defend herself.

The Duchesse says her object in appealing from the decision and fighting the decree of annulment is not for the purpose of preventing Comte Boni from marrying again, but to keep him from reclaiming their two sons. **LIMA, Peru Aug. 1.**—(Special).—There is absolutely no truth in the report current in Europe and America of a catastrophe in this city. There has been no extraordinary occurrence of any kind. The rumor probably arose from the fact that telegraphic communication between here and Santiago, Chile, is interrupted.
