MOSCOW, Oct. 18.—S-multaneously with the opening here of the central office of the new Russian State Bank on November 5, branches will be established at Petrograd, Kazan, Khar'kov, Rostov and Novo Nikol'sk.

M. Scheinmann, who signed the Russia-German trade agreement on behalf of Russia, will be president of the bank.

The official quotation on the dollar is 62,000 rubles, but some speculators give as high as 92,000.

The Commissariat of Agriculture has published an appeal to Russian Agrarians abroad to return to the country offering them favorable terms to colonize agricultural communities. The Doukhobors of Canada also are invited to return.

(The Doukhobors are members of a sect expelled from Russia about 1885. They are found in Western Canada.)

REGISTERED MAIL STOLEN

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18.—Four armed and masked bandits last evening held up three clerks in the Rialto branch post office in the downtown district and escaped in an automobile with one sack of mail. The value of the loot is not known.

Hints for the Motorist

The Overheated Battery

THE LIFE OF A BATTERY is materially shortened if it is allowed to run at temperatures above 110° F. for considerable periods of time. The most common cause of overheating is especially to be guarded against. It is caused by too high amperage from the generator, which results in overcharging; by low liquid in the cells, thus increasing their resistance; or by too close proximity of the battery to the engine. If, after long trips, on warm days, the battery, when touched, seems considerably above normal heat, it is well to take the temperature of the liquid with a stem graduated thermometer and, if it is repeatedly found to be over 110°, steps should be taken to reduce the heating, as otherwise, the plates may shed badly, buckle and break down their insulation. If the battery loses water very rapidly and is continually at top charge, overcharging is going on and the easiest remedy is to burn all lights on long daytime runs, which should reduce the battery charging current to zero. However, if the generator amperage is too high, the battery will still receive current with the lights burning and it is then necessary to reduce the generator output to such a point as will as nearly as possible correspond to the battery's requirements.

GEAR SHIFTING TROUBLE

F. W. C. writes: I cannot engage low gear on my car without first engaging reverse and then trying to shift. The clutch is set in suddenly, there is a snapping sound. Please explain.

Answer: Presumably, your clutch wears somewhat, causing the countershaft and reverse gear to engage with it. Quite likely, the countershaft low gear is quite badly buried from use and the combination of the spinning and the battered condition of the gear prevents meshing. The reverse idler gear, being comparatively little used, may be very little battered and the sliding low and reverse gear may engage with it much easier than with the countershaft low gear, even though the latter is spinning. When once the car is in gear, the clutch and countershaft are stopped from spinning either they do not take up their spinning again in the brief instant occupied in passing from reverse to forward or the slipping sound is lost except that it seems to have scaled off one of the rear wheels. The part where the brake-band takes hold. Why does it give out here and nowhere else?

Answer: The brake-drum has been hot enough to burn the paint off. Whether it is because this brake is doing all the work—the other one acting weakly or hardly at all—and overheating has occurred when descending long hills or whether one of the bands fails to release from this drum and drags constantly, we do not know. At any rate, both sets of brakes should be equalized and adjusted to clear their drums fully when released, which will prevent sufficient heat from being developed at either drum to affect the paint.

E. A. L. asks: How frequently is it necessary to have an auto battery recharged outside the car? I find that I have to have mine taken to the charging station.

VIENNA WOMEN DEMONSTRATE

VIENNA, Oct. 18.—A remarkable demonstration of housewives against profiteers and soaring prices was staged today.

At a mass meeting at the Town Hall there was great excitement among the women of all classes. Children were lifted into the air by their mothers, while the women yelled:

"Children are the only things that are left to us. We will not let the peasant food swindlers murder them."

"Hang the speculators to lamp-posts."

"Down with the Government which is unable to do away with usury."

Ambulances were kept busy removing fainting women from the crowds. Finally the demonstrators marched to the Parliament Building where they were addressed by the Finance Minister who promised that the Government would remedy the situation.

Marching into Rings Strasse the infuriated mobs started beating passersby and stormed cafes, restaurants and hotels. Masses of police finally cleared the streets, making many arrests.
