A LARGE and very enthusiastic audience gathered at the Opera House last night when Prof. John A. Nicholls gave his graphically illustrated lecture on The War in South Africa. Starting from Southampton, Prof. Nicholls conducted his audience to Cape town, and then on a tour through South Africa, describing the country, its early settlement, the great trek of the Boers, the founding of the two Republics and the outbreak and progress of the war. The graphic illustration of the persons and places of interest, and the eloquent descriptions of Prof. Nicholls held the closest attention of the audience. The pictures of the Island Contingent was greeted with a storm of cheers, and as portraits of private Alfred Piggs, and Roland Taylor were placed on the canvass Prof. Nicholls paid an eloquent tribute to their patriotism of which they had given the supreme test of their lives. A beautiful picture of the Queen closed the entertainment proper and the audience united in the National Anthem. A series of Life Motion pictures reproducing scenes of the famous Passion Play were given at the close. The entertainment was given under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. and it is possible that an arrangement may be made to have Prof. Nicholl give his noted lecture on "A Night in the Slums of New York" before he leaves the Island. Prof. Nicholls goes to Summerside today and the people of that Town may expect a grand treat.
