Australian Tennis Stars Are Downed By Great Britain

Mother Country Wins European Zone Final Three Matches To Two — Off To France To Meet United States In Series.

WIMBLEDON, England, July 16. — (A.P.) — By the deft process of guile overcoming brawn, Great Britain today had conquered Australia's tennis forces and headed for France and battle with the United States in the inter-zone finals next week end for the right to challenge the French for the historic Davis cup.

Crawford Again Shines
Jack Crawford, the brilliant Aussie who conquered Ellsworth Vines in the Wimbledon singles final last week to become the ruler of the men's tennis world, followed McGrath and Austin to the famous centre court and walloped H. G. H. Lee, English veteran, 8-6, 7-5, 6-4, for Australia's final victory, but the match was an anti-climax and served only to run out the string. Lee was substituted for Fred Perry, top ranked Englishman, who was withdrawn as soon as Austin clinched the series. Perry, with a slightly strained shoulder, stayed behind for treatment when Austin, George Patrick Hughes, and Lee started for Paris today to practice for the series with the United States that starts in the Roland Garros stadium Friday. Perry will join them in Paris Tuesday. Daniel Maskell, British professional champion, will help them practice.

FAVORITES WIN TENNIS MEET

ENGLISH MARKS-MEN LEAD AT BISLEY

Canadians Make Fine Showing in Daily Mail Match.

BISLEY CAMP, England, July 16.—(C.P. Cable)—Greatest week of the year for the sharpshooters of His Majesty's forces all over the Empire opens tomorrow, the climax being the final stage of the classic King's prize on Saturday.

Intensive shooting in the National Rifle Association's 70th annual meeting over the famed Bisley ranges got under way Saturday with five big matches, and although the Canadian team were well up in all events, English marksmen got all the prizes.

Sergt. J. Dean of the Wimbledon Rifle School captured the Wimbledon service rifle cup and \$40, recording highest possible score of 50 in the match fired at 600 yards. Dean also won the Stock Exchange trophy and \$60, scoring 147 out of a possible 160 in this great service rifle match, fired at 200, 500 and 600 yards.

Wins Mail Prize

Of the three other historic competitions decided Saturday, Sergt. W. Reece of the Glamorgan Constabulary won the Daily Mail match at 500 yards by recording a perfect score of 50 to take the silver cup and \$50; Major D. H. Steers of the Royal Engineers won the Times Royal trophy and \$50 with a perfect score of 50, the match being at 200 yards, and six English marksmen finished in a tie for the Duke of Cambridge service rifle competition at the longest range of the day, 900 yards, all posting up perfect scores.

Heads Canadians

Lt.-Col. C. W. Gibson of the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry, Hamilton, took all the honors for the Canadians Saturday. He placed fifth in the Wimbledon match and placed eighth in the Duke of Cambridge shoot, in which he scored 49 out of a possible 50.

List Of Entries For Northam Race Meet Announced

Cream Of Maritime Race Horses To Compete In Milligan And Morrison Classic Wed. 19th.

Edgar Milligan of Milligan and Morrison, is certainly to be congratulated on the quantity and quality of the entries he has attracted to his big mid-summer race meet at Northam on next Wednesday afternoon, July 19th. Some of the greatest horses in America will take part in the Free-For-All, including Calumet Browne, who won one of the fastest heats on the Grand Circuit last year at Toledo, where he took his record of 2.01 3-4, Marjorie M., who lowered the track record to 2.07 3-4 at Charlottetown Exhibition last year, Darkey Grattan 2.02 1-4, one of the biggest winners over the half mile tracks in the U. S. A. two years ago, Volo Rico 2.04, Neil Frisco and several others. This will be a race such as will be offered by few tracks in Canada. In fact we are safe in saying that no track in Canada has so far this year served up that brand of speed to its patrons.

The 215 trot has eight entries with the sensational Addie McGraw under new ownership meeting Frank J. Ortolan, who was such a good winner last year, King Frisco, who took his record at Charlottetown Exhibition, easily outclassing the other horses, High Toby, who holds the track record for Northam trotting, jointly with Great Scott, Shenandoah, one of the fastest trotters in Cape Breton, Helen D., a good winner on the Bay State Circuit last year, Golden, making his first appearance of the season and Peter Dawes who is in the pink.

The 222 Pace. This has seven entries and is sure to be a good race. Many are anxious to see Yorkola, Mr. Henley and Johnnie Miles tackle Mac Volo, Al B. Jr., who worked in 2:13 1-2 recently and Sparkie, 2:14 1-4 from Halifax. There are seventeen horses entered in the 227 trot and pace, but no doubt some of them will fail to answer the starters bell which will perhaps be just as well because it would be an unwieldy field and would have to be divided into two sections. The possibilities are that at least twelve will be on hand to try conclusions and while Winnie Winkle, 2:13 1-2 seems to have the foot of the bunch yet who can tell what may happen with such a large list of starters.

All in all the day will be one long to be remembered because of its splendid program of races, boxing exhibitions, dancing, etc. The magnificent grounds and buildings, the large crowd, the thrill of the racing and the music and laughter will certainly make Wednesday afternoon at Northam an event that one cannot afford to miss.

Britisher Breaks Mile Record In Thrilling Race

Jack Lovelock, New Zealand, Representing Oxford University Runs Sensational Race In 4 Minutes 7.6 Seconds.

PRINCETON, N. J., July 16.—Jack Lovelock, curly-haired New Zealand youth, today had electrified the athletic world by smashing the two-year-old world record for the mile run. In the picturesque setting of old Nassau, Lovelock, representing Oxford, on Saturday ran the greatest mile of all time in the cloistered seclusion of old Princeton.

The New Zealander, who came half-way round the world to flash his sensational performance, defeated Bill Bonthron of Princeton, to break the tape in the dazzling time of four minutes, 7.6 seconds. Bonthron, beaten off by seven yards came home in four minutes, 8.7 seconds.

Wheat Jumps To Three Figure Mark

WINNIPEG, July 16.—May wheat flashed to the three figure level on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange Saturday in an abbreviated week-end session that saw buying power unequalled in the last four years. Not since August 25, 1930, has any wheat future on the Winnipeg Exchange run into three figures.

Closing prices were 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents higher. Surging upward in the opening minutes of trading, values had little difficulty in maintaining their advance despite heavy profit-taking selling. At the finish all deliveries were close to the high points, July at 92 1/2, October 95 1/2, December 96 1/2 and May 101 1/2 cents.
