Report 50,000 British troops

LONDON, Oct. 21 (CP Cable)—A Zurich dispatch to the exchange telegraph news agency today quoted the Milan newspaper Popolo d'Italia as saying it "believes Sir Archibald P. Wavell has at present at his disposal 50,000 British troops including Canadians, New Zealanders, South Africans, and Australians to defend the oil deposits of the Caucasus."

Russians admit Germans make some headway on Black Sea route to rich Caucasus.

MOSCOW, Oct. 22 (Wednesday)—(AP)—Repulse of several strong German attacks in fighting of undiminished ferocity on three sectors before Moscow was announced early today by the Soviet information bureau. Particularly stubborn fighting continued in the Mzhalsk and Maloyaroslavets sectors, 57 and 65 miles west and southwest of Moscow, and in the Kalinin area, 95 miles to the northwest, said the early morning communique broadcast by the Moscow radio.

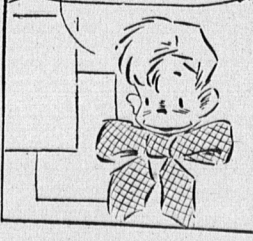
