**Hin's for the Motorist**

Maintaining Lamp Efficiency

Replace Dimmed Bulbs and Keep Reflectors Clean

DURING THE SEASON OF LONG NIGHTS, the lamp equipment is of specially vital importance and is heavily worked and it behooves the motorist to see that it is kept at its best efficiency. If any of the bulbs are blackened or dim, they should be replaced, for not only does such a bulb give very little useful light, while still consuming nearly full current, and gives the car that carries it a neglected appearance, but blackening is a pretty sure sign that it will soon burn out, probably at the most inopportune moment. Prudent replacement often forestalls such annoyances. Lamp turnouts are necessarily rather frequent during this season of the year and it is essential that the spare bulb equipment be maintained at full strength, with this fact in mind.

Be sure that the extra bulbs carried are correct as to type, voltage and candle-power, and that there may be no disappointments.

Don't use extra high candle-power headlight bulbs in winter, for the battery usually has all it can do to maintain those of ordinary size.

In putting in a few headlight bulbs be sure that it focusses correctly and occasionally check up the focussing by driving the car head on near a building and see if the two lamps throw equal sized evenly bright circles of light at the same and the proper height from the ground. If not, use the focussing adjustments and change the lamp inclination if necessary. Keep the lenses clear of mud and dust, and if the reflectors are dim with dust remove it carefully with absorbent cotton moistened in alcohol, wiping with the cotton from the center to the edges.

It is stated here today that the rival forces working for the staging of the big bout here, have joined hands, or are about to do so. These

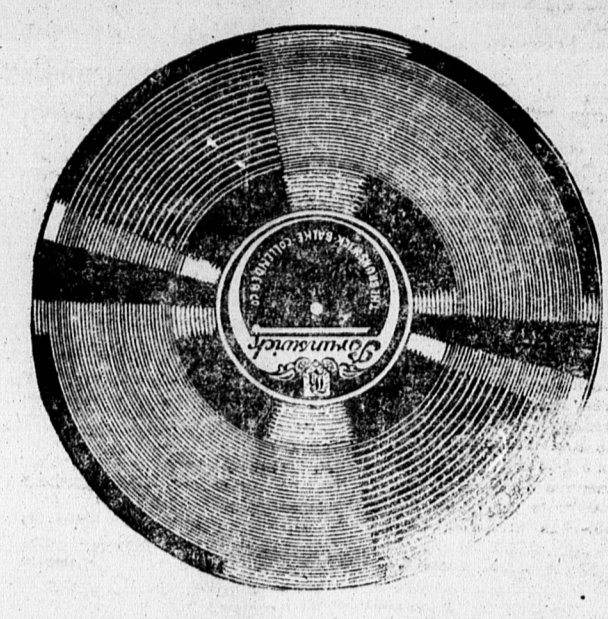
