General Election In B. C. Oct. 25



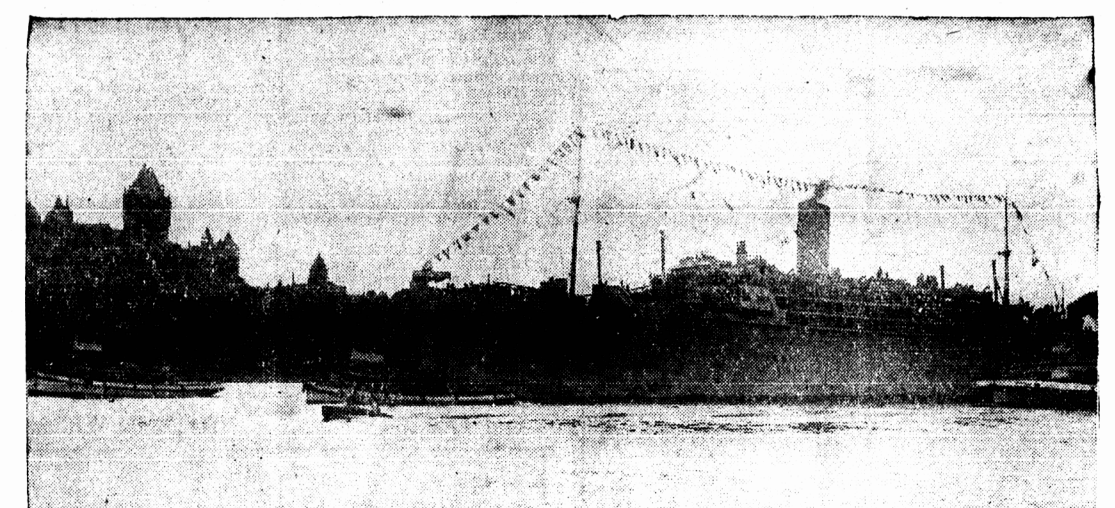

Canadians Are Changing Jobs At Rapid Rate

OTTAWA, Aug. 31—(CP)—Canadians are changing jobs at a rapid pace as the country's economy reverts to a peacetime basis. Labor Minister Mitchell disclosed today. Some 1,300,000 workers have been placed in jobs by the national employment service within the last three months but there still are 154,000 unfilled jobs in the country, Mr. Mitchell told a press conference which also was attended by his deputy, Arthur MacNamara. Mr. Mitchell said he was confident Canada was well equipped to meet the difficulties of conversion and added that the time might come when the government's probability would be to control a boom rather than find jobs for workers.

Gunman Is Wounded By Montreal Bank Employee

Police Drag-Net Out For Two Other Members Of Suspected Robber Gang.

MONTREAL, Aug. 31—A young gunman was critically wounded and police recovered \$26,000 in stolen bonds, two revolvers and a stolen car today after a suspicious accountant out-faced and out-shot the gunman in an uptown bank. With his capture, police believed a big step had been taken toward breaking up a three-person gang suspected of participating in half a dozen bank robberies in Ontario and in a \$17,000 department store holdup here. Nineteen-year-old Joseph Pelletier, who broke out of Waterloo County Jail at Kitchener, Ont., last month after being sentenced to nine years in penitentiary for armed bank robbery, remained unconscious in hospital after an emergency operation to remove a bullet from his back. He was shot as he started to pull a gun from his coat after the attempt to cash \$6,000 in stolen bonds.

Permit Teachers Still Required In Large Numbers

Some improvement in teacher shortage in Prince Edward Island is reported this year by officials of the Provincial Department of Education. At present there are more schools without teachers than during 1944, but applications to teach are being received daily and the situation is actually better than it was at this time last year. One explanation given is that most districts are now having more generous supplements. However, many teachers continue to be employed on permits only. Last year there were eighty teachers in this class, and this year the number is nearly as great.

Letitia Leaves For Pacific Today

HALIFAX, Aug. 31—(CP)—The hospital ship Letitia, tropicalized and with her capacity increased from 700 to about 1,000 patients, is due to sail from here tomorrow for the Pacific to bring home Canadian prisoners of war repatriated from Japanese prison camps.

Hon. Angus L. Is Chosen To Lead N. S. Liberals

HALIFAX, Aug. 31—(CP)—Hon. Angus L. Macdonald, former Federal Naval Minister and Premier of Nova Scotia from 1933 to 1940, today was unanimously chosen leader of the Nova Scotia Liberal Party and Premier-designate at a Liberal rally held here today. Mr. Macdonald's name was the only one to come before the convention.

1,200 Canadians To Train Dutch Force

THE HAGUE, Aug. 31—Reuters' dispatches said today the army was planning to lend the Netherlands Government 1,200 officers and men to train a Dutch force which will take over Netherlands possessions in the Far East. The scheme is under consideration by the Canadian and Netherlands Governments.

Hard Liquor Ration In N. S. Is Doubled

HALIFAX, Aug. 31—(CP)—The Nova Scotia hard liquor ration will be increased from 26 ounces to 52 ounces for each four-week period, effective Tuesday, Sept. 4, it was announced today by A. S. Mahon, Provincial Liquor Commissioner. The alternate quotas of two dozen quarts of beer, or four quarts of native wine, or two quarts of imported wine every four weeks will remain unchanged.

Broaden Plan To Include 3 Services

OTTAWA, Aug. 31—(CP)—Navy, Army and Air Force personnel in Canada who wish to return to former employment or to university or similar educational institutions may gain release from the forces to do so under a joint policy announced tonight by Defence Minister Abbott and Air Minister Gibson.

In a statement the Ministers said the new accelerated release from the forces would be carried out "to the maximum extent which the continuing requirements of the three services permit." The new policy had been planned "with a special view to meeting the demand of industry, business and the professions for return of trained personnel."

Present Position Of War Industry

OTTAWA, Aug. 31—Here is the summarized report Reconstruction Minister Howe made tonight of the present position of Canada's war industry:

- Shipbuilding—Building and repairs will continue well into 1946.
- Aircraft—Almost all orders cancelled.
- Chemicals and explosives—Production almost entirely stopped.
- Armoured vehicles—Discontinued.
- Automotive vehicles—To stop shortly.
- Railway equipment—Domestic and export production to be stepped up.
- Instruments and signals—U. S. contracts cancelled. No change yet in British contracts.
- Armament and naval equipment—Orders for U. S. being terminated. No cancellation yet of British orders.
- Clothing and textiles—With few cancellations production continuing.
