CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Jeany. There has been an increase in the amount collected of Real Estate and personal property, which is an evidence of progress within the city. He was pleased to be able to report that the committee increased the amount placed to the credit of sinking fund accounts. The income of the city was not large and for that reason they had endeavored to make the expenditure conform as near as possible to the income in order not to be compelled to increase the tax rate. This is low and strong efforts should be made to keep it down.
Coun. Riley said he felt it his duty to acknowledge the great assistance given the finance committee by His Worship the Mayor, and stated that to him the success of the year's work was in a great measure due. As will be seen by the report submitted, the sinking funds are favorably invested, a considerable sum in cash is de-

posted in the Royal Bank at a favorable rate of interest and the balance is in debentures.

Coun. McDonald, chairman of the city committee, brought down his report for the past year. It showed a reduction in the cost of maintenance of wooden sidewalks. Before the introduction of permanent walks this used to cost \$3,300 per year, last year it cost \$1,200, this being \$200 less than in 1909. A saving of \$2,100 per year is thus made, enough to pay the interest on \$50,000 in debentures.

On permanent walks he reported that during the year one mile of concrete walks had been laid within the city proper, making a total mileage of 2½, this being one third of the total sidewalk mileage of this city, which is twenty-four miles.

Sixteen hundred running feet of Meadam work had been done. The committee recommended stone curbing on all streets instead of the plank curbing at present in use.

One hundred concrete stepping stones, permitting driver crossings and free drainage had been laid.

On maintenance of streets the total amount of money expended was \$6,308.21. The appropriation was \$6,400, leaving a surplus of \$91.79. In permanent works \$12,339 had been spent.

The committee recommended entire McAdam work on the streets. The cost of stone is so high that this would be the most effectual and economical way; this system is used in all the larger cities. They also recommended the purchase of a street scraper for cleaning purposes, claiming it could be purchased for \$350 which would do better work than the present system, and it would save its own price in one year in running

The reports of the Tender and Public Property Committee was presented by Coun. Lane and the Market, Fire, Police and Light Committee report were presented by Coun's. Campbell, Johnson, Taylor and McKenna.

The report of the city and police court, the school board, water and sewerage reports and Health Officer report were also presented.

Remarks were made by Water Commissioner Nicholson, ex-Mayor Paton and Col. Stewart, after which the meeting adjourned.

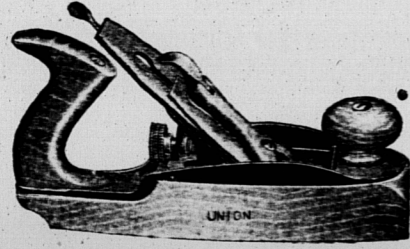

DEATH OF MARY A. McPHERSON.

The friends of Miss Mary A. McPheron of Darlington, P. E. I., who are gathered together today, writes her pastor from Rutland, Mass., to show their love for her memory in the performance of these last sad rites, will be pleased to know that her life among the people with whom she lived for a number of years preceding her death, was a life for which no one need apologize. She made a host of friends in Massachusetts, who are mourning what seems to them her untimely death. It was remarkable, the interest they showed in her when they discovered the dangerous character of the illness that finally resulted in her death. They visited her, sent her flowers and delicacies, and when she was out of the reach of personal visitation, wrote her letters of condolence and cheer and affection.

She was a Christian girl, and died in the full assurance of the Faith which had sustained her for years during which she revealed great interest in the church and its work. She was a devoted attendant at the church services, and the Christian people with whom she had fellowship recognized her as one worthy of their fullest trust.

When she learned the nature of the disease that had laid hold upon her she made an heroic fight to escape its deadly power. She was exceedingly brave; she wanted to live, for life contained much for her she believed. But when at last she knew the struggle was useless she became reconciled to the issue and passed away feeling that she could trust in the wisdom of a Higher Power. Her gentleness and patience did not forsake her during her trial of illness; it was a delight to her friends to minister to her because every act was appreciated so fully.

As her pastor, I called on her almost every day during the time of her illness just preceding her departure for the Sanatorium. She was greatly comforted with the reading of the Scriptures and the offering of

prayer. It was a real joy to minister to such a devoted Christian, and to speak to her about the things relating to the eternal peace of the soul. I am sure that her message to you in this hour of sorrow would be one of comfort; she would not have you sorrow for her as one regarding whom there is no hope in the life to come. I believe her wish might be expressed in the beautiful lines of Mrs. Browning when she says:

"Of all the thoughts of God That are born inward unto souls afar, Along the psalmists' music deep, Now tell me if that any is For gift or grace surpassing this, 'He giveth His beloved sleep.'"

"And friends, dear friends, when it shall be, That this low breath has gone from me, And round my bier ye come to weep, Let one most loving of you all Say: 'Not a tear must o'er her fall; 'He giveth his beloved, sleep.'"
