(Continued from page 1.) amount subscribed has been paid in, and you are doubtless aware that the total amount should now be paid in full as all the pledges matured last July. Every effort has been made to close the collecting portion of the Fund, but the great difficulty encountered is that a large number of subscribers have definitely stated that they will not complete their payments until the work, for which this money was originally subscribed, is under way. I feel confident that a large portion of the \$22,642.18 yet due is collectable, but I doubt if any part can be collected until it is finally decided to commence work on the improvements and additions for which this money was intended.

There are yet quite a number of accounts on which nothing has been paid. I herewith submit a memorandum of the number of individuals and the totals in the different localities as follows:

This shows a slight improvement on last year when the number of individuals was 399 and the amount \$5,708.00. You will see by the foregoing that we have on hand \$30,808.08 and there is yet due \$22,642.18. This latter item will be subject to a reduction as several subscribers have died and some have left this country. I feel sure that there should be at least \$16,000, yet collectable, possibly more.

When the Campaign was started in 1923, it was intended in addition to what has already been done, to install a new heating plant, remodel the main building, including new roof and brass plumbing at a total expenditure of about \$50,000.

In conclusion, I beg to say that if it should happen that this Annual Meeting tonight, in conjunction with the Trustees, decides to proceed immediately with the improvements as specified in 1923, I will take immediate steps to collect the balance of these subscriptions, but until a decided move is made towards carrying out the original intention, it will be impossible to make the collection.

ANCHORS WIN OPENER IN A NINTH INNING RALLY

The Great War Veterans Band arrived on the scene and took their place on the bleachers, every one in attendance standing at attention with uncovered heads while the band rendered O Canada. His Worship Mayor Miller then stepped to the pitchers box and delivered the first ball to Cullen who was on the receiving end for the Rovers, as the ball touched the catchers mitt the stands rocked with applause and the game was on. As was predicted the boys were in fine shape for a beginner and with the exception of a couple of costly errors was possible as good a game as has been seen here for some time.

McKenzie and Carbonell are two new twirlers for the Rovers this season and showed up well, McKenzie had five strike outs in as many innings, Carbonell had one in four while Connors fanned the only man to face him.
