The reason of the delay is because of the fact that the Director of the project, on the part of the Dominion Government, has so much to occupy him this summer that he will not have time to visit this Province and decide upon a site for the proposed station. That a great many of the people of this province will hear this news with regret goes without saying, but in the present condition of affairs there appears to be nothing to do but to wait until next year when it is hoped the accomplishment of the scheme from which is hoped much for the benefit of this island, will be successfully carried out. In the meantime measures leading to the final closing up of the Government Stock Farm will be followed although for this year the planting of various seeds as in former years has been taken place for the purpose of determining the relative value of different crops.
