Model Engine Builder's Hobby Fills Two Years' Spare Time



Two or three evenings a week and some Saturday afternoons will find people are taking in a show of a hobby match, Roland Arthur Plumptre goes down into his basement at 4942 Isabella Avenue, Montreal, and sets to work on his scale model of the Canadian National Railway Hudson type "5700" class locomotive. He has been working on the model for two and a half years and aims at completion in the early summer.

When completed the model will be a 1/4-inch scale copy of the swift giant. All of the work has been done by Mr. Plumptre with the exception of a small electric motor which is used to operate the model at a scale speed of 50 to 60 miles an hour, and the driving wheels, which were purchased from outside sources.

The length of the locomotive and tender is 23 1/2 inches, the width 2 3/4 inches, height 3 3/4 inches. The actual "5700" class which haul the "International Limited," No. 15 Westbound daily between Toronto and Montreal, measures 92 feet 8 1/2 inches overall in working order, complete with 14,000 gallons of water and 20 tons of coal, the real "5700" weighs 62,000 pounds, while Mr. Plumptre's model brings the scale to 15 pounds. The Canadian National locomotive has driving wheels of 80 inches outside diameter capable of obtaining high speed. The boiler pressure is 275 pounds to the square inch and the big fire box is fed by a mechanical stoker. A clear vision device provides the driver with unobstructed view under any condition of rain or snow.

GEORGE MCKAY DIES SUDDENLY

George McKay, popular and well-known local business man, died at his home on Talbot street on Wednesday morning after an illness of only a few days. His sudden death was a great shock to his many friends here and throughout the country.

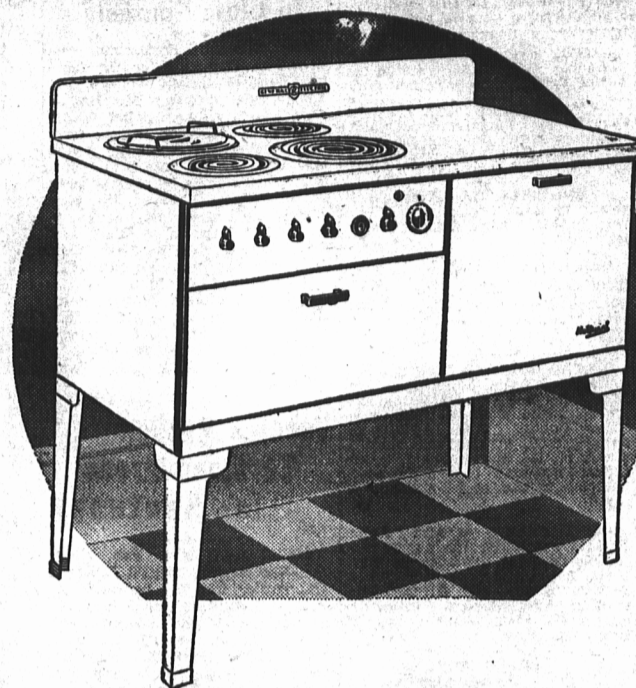
Funeral services were held in the Lemley chapel at 3:30 o'clock on Saturday afternoon and burial was in the Union cemetery. Active pallbearers were W. E. Ropes, George Hammer, Ray Couch, Leland Clark, Willard Eaton and Nick Doherty, and honorary pallbearers were E. G. Abbot, Clarence Barney, Dr. J. W. Doughty, Harry Mullen Sr., A.H. Bingham, L. E. Alverson and George Clark.

George McKay was born at New London, Prince Edward Island, Canada, on May 5, 1881, and was associated in business there with his father, who was postmaster and who was also engaged in the shipping business. In 1900, Mr. McKay came to the United States and entered the hotel business in Tacoma. Then, about 1913, he came to Sedro-Woolley, where he has since made his home with the exception of a few years in California. For many years he was proprietor of the Wilcox club and following his return from California, he went into partnership in The Castle with his old friend and business associate, Harry Mullen Sr.

During his long residence here, George McKay endeared himself to many because of his jolly disposition, infectious laugh and genuine friendliness. He was an ardent sportsman, loved hunting and fishing, and took a keen interest in athletic events of all kinds.

Mr. McKay was a member of the Masonic lodge at New London. He is survived by his wife, Myrtle of this city, two nieces, Georgia Peterson, Seattle, and Hawley Lyse, Oakland, California, and a nephew, Walter Nicholson, Seattle. (Patriot please copy)
