**MORE NAVAL RECRUITS.**—The two latest recruits to sign on for the navy are Messrs George E. McNeill, Summerside, and James A. McDonald, Ellis River.

**NEW LONDON RACES.**—The races on the New London harbor ice, postponed from Wednesday, take place this afternoon, weather permitting. There are three classes and a good afternoon's sport is anticipated.

**SUCCESSFUL OPERATION.**—Mr. Edward Pendergast, who underwent a serious operation in the Charlottetown Hospital some time ago, was able yesterday to return to his home in Kensington.

**THE MAILS.**—Boats with five bags of mail left Capes Traverse at 4:10 yesterday and boats with forty-seven bags left Cape Tormentine at 8 a. m. and landed on this side at 12:40. This mail was brought to the city by the regular train arriving at 5:25.

**CHILDREN'S CARNIVAL.**—A large number of children enjoyed themselves to the utmost at the carnival arranged especially for themselves at the Arena last night. Arrived in fantastic costumes, they glided around in merry fashion to the lively strains of the band. There was excellent ice and the youngsters thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

**APPOINTMENTS.**—At the meeting of the Executive of the Provincial Government on Thursday evening Mr. John Warren of Kensington and Mr. Elphalest Howatt, French River, were appointed Justices of the Peace and Commissioners for taking Acknowledgment of Deeds. Two applications for letters patent were granted—one to Turner, Holman, Ltd., Charlottetown, and H. H. Beer, Ltd., Summerside.

**ADVERTISE SEED OATS.**—A large number of inquiries are being received from Ontario and Quebec farmers asking where they can purchase seeds oats. There was a good oat crop last year in some districts, particularly on tile-drained land. Farmers having seed oats for sale should advertise them in at least one paper. Some have reported the kinds, quantities and prices of seeds for sale direct to the Seed Branch and this information is being supplied in answer to the inquiries received.

**NEW SCHEDULE.**—The mechanics at the P. E. I. R. were put on a new schedule of wages Thursday. For some time past they have been working nine hours a day, for ten hours a day. Owing to the shortage of coal a schedule of eight hours a day for five days in the week, was ordered to be put in force. The various unions of machinists, boiler makers, etc., objected to this, and a delegation waited on the management, with the result that they were given eight hours a day for six days in the week. With this arrangement, the men were satisfied. This means a reduction in pay equivalent to one hour per day.
