There were only a few matches played in the first few hours of play, but spectators had lots to watch as over a score of matches were run off during the afternoon.

Only one match remained to be played before the second round was completed in men's singles. First round was finished early in the day and ten second round matches were run off before play was halted in the evening.

First upset of the tournament in the two days' play occurred in the men's mixed doubles when Art Wright and Jack Kenny, a local team, eliminated George Collins, of Halifax, and A. NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—(CP)—Rookie Sidney Hudson from the Class D Florida League barely missed a no-hit game today as he shut out Philadelphia Athletics 11-0 for Washington Senators. He yielded a single safely to Sam Chapman in the seventh inning of the Washington game. Earlier this season Hudson missed no-hit fame by the same margin at the bat St. Louis Browns 1-0. In that game Rip Radcliff doubled in the ninth inning. By beating Philadelphia, Hudson won his 10th victory of the season. Calling upon Bobby Feller to squelch a ninth-inning rally, Cleveland Indians defeated Chicago White Sox 3-2 in the second game of a Chicago doubleheader after succumbing in the opener 5-1 to southpaw Thornton Lee's two-hit pitching. Manager Oscar Vitt sent Feller, who had scored his 18th mound decision Sunday to the mound in the last of the ninth with two runners on base and two men out. First batter to face Feller, Moose Solters, pinch-hitting for Clint Brown, lifted a short fly to left. Jeff Heath muffed it and both runners scored. But Feller then required the side when he forced Jimmy Welsh to pop to Russ Peters, Johnny Allen started the game and held the Sox to five hits until the ninth. The world champion New York Yankees continued to crumble at Boston, losing their fourth straight game and first baseman Babe Dahlgren as Boston Red Sox hammered out an 8-3 decision. Dahlgren was struck on the right eye by a foul tip while batting in the eighth inning. An examination revealed that Dahlgren was not seriously hurt. The champions lost catcher Bill Dickey Sunday with a spike wound and have played two games in Boston without third baseman Red Rolfe, who is suffering from pink eye although he was able to complete Dahlgren's turn at bat today. Rookie Earl Johnson, Boston's starting pitcher, also was struck by a batted ball in the first inning and had to retire at the start of the second because of a bruise on his right shin.

TORONTO, Aug. 6.—(CP)—Nearly the whole Toronto Maple Leaf hockey team and a scattering of other professional players signed today for service in the non-permanent active militia. Twenty players are in the group of recruits. Leaf players who signed up are Gordon Drillon, Turk Broda, Bob Davidson, Red Heron, Syl Apps, Billy Taylor, Jack Church, Phil Stein, Coach Hap Day and Johnny O'Flaherty, Toronto amateur who will try out with the Leafs this fall.
