## THE COOK'S CORNER

**Biscuits Baked in Cheese Sauce**  
1 cup flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
2 tablespoons shortening  
1-2 teaspoon salt  
Milk (about 1-2 cup)  
1 cup stewed tomatoes  
Salt, pepper, sugar  
Thin slices cheese  
Method: Sift the flour, salt and baking powder. Rub in the shortening and add enough milk to make a fairly soft biscuit dough. Spread in a thin layer in a shallow pan and pour over it the tomatoes which have been seasoned with salt, pepper and sugar.  
Cook the tomatoes down fairly thick for this, so they aren't too juicy. Now cover the tomatoes with thin slices of cheese and dot this with butter. Bake in a medium hot, 400 deg. F. oven until the biscuit dough is baked and the cheese melted and slightly browned. Cut in squares to serve.

## Household Scrapbook

**Table Oilcloth**  
The next time a new oilcloth is bought for the wooden kitchen table, use a flour paste to fasten it instead of tacking it down. The oilcloth will last much longer and will not wrinkle nor crack.

**Mud Stains**  
Let the mud stains dry on the cloth, then break the crust and rub lightly to prevent driving the dirt into the material. If there are any remaining marks, rub with a little alcohol.

**A Good Habit**  
A good habit to form after using lemons is to wipe off the hands with the skins. This will remove all stains from respectable paring and will soften and whiten the skin.
