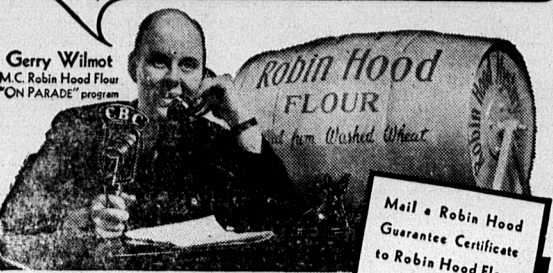

Bacon Muffins

- 2 cups flour 3 teaspoons baking powder 1-2 cup bacon fried crisp 1-4 cup butter melted 2 tablespoons sugar 1 egg, beaten 1 cup milk 3 tablespoons bacon drippings

Method: Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt. Mix in the bacon which has been fried and cooled...

- 1-1/2 cups sifted flour 3-4 teaspoon salt 1-4 teaspoon soda 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 cup butter 2 eggs, well-beaten 3 tablespoons sour milk or buttermilk 1-2 cups thinly sliced banana (3 bananas)

Method: Sift the flour and then measure it. Sift again with the salt, soda and baking powder...

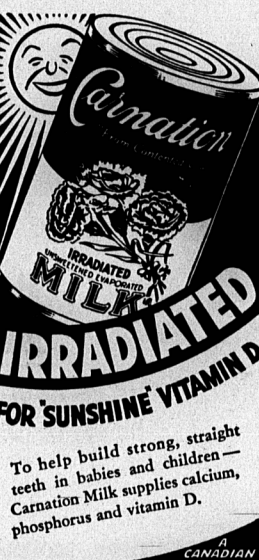

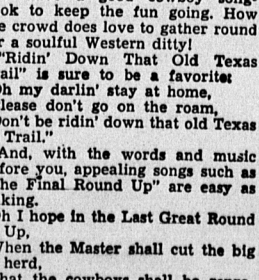
