FAMOUS FORTUNES DUG FROM EARTH

ST JOHN, Nov 24—Nowhere does fortunes indulge her love of the dramatic and the sensational more fully than in the gold fields and the silver mines, the story of which is crowded with incidents so startling that even the most daring writer might well hesitate to introduce them into his fiction.

BOY OF TWO BRINGS HIS BRIDE HOME

NEW YORK, Nov 24—Theodore Leslie is today certainly the youngest married man in the country. Theodore is two, and he has brought back from Portuguese-Congo land, where he was born, a dusky bride of seven, the daughter of a Congo chief. Theodore's parents, Dr and Mrs William H. Leslie, who have just returned on a vacation from a missionary post, explained today that when he was born the chief of the Dayakas, who had 40 wives of his own, sent him a spare grand-daughter for a wife, as a token of regard.

As Theodore was ladly in need of a nurse, the present was accepted and the royal African properties satisfied at the same time. The wife accompanied her husband. It was only humanity to bring her, for she explained to her mother-in-law that she would surely be killed if left behind. Her people would believe that she told the tribal secrets to Theodore, who carried them away to a strange land. Bride and groom will both return to Congoland when Dr and Mrs Leslie have exhausted their furlough.

CANADA CALLED A MONTE CARLO

PRMBROKE, Ont., Nov 24—"Canada has become the Monte Carlo of the North American continent," was the startling statement made by Rev. W. J. Knox in the course of his sermon on Gambling in Calvin church, Pembroke, last evening. The reverend gentleman based his discourse on Jeremiah 17, 11: "He that getteth riches, and not by right, shall leave them in the midst of his days, and at his end shall be a fool." In strong language such as the above quotations the preacher pointed out many of the evils arising from gambling in any form. Particular attention was paid to race track gambling and to the efforts now being made to have our laws amended so that form of gambling cannot have the foothold it has today in Canada, thus bringing its neighbors in line in this respect with our neighbors to the south of us. He urged the electors to sign the petition to the houses of parliament praying for such an amendment to our laws.

EIGHT PERISHED IN TENEMENT FIRE

NEW YORK, Nov 24—Five persons were burned to death in a tenement fire in Brooklyn early this morning. The building, located at Herkimer Street and Havens Place, was occupied by 11 Italian families. Beside the dead, eight Italians were seriously burned and were taken to nearby hospitals.

CUSTOMS TARIFF TO BE REVISED. THE HAGUE, Nov 24—In the second chamber today the Finance ministers announced that the proposed bill to revise the customs tariff would allow the prime necessities of life to be admitted free of duty.

KING'S CO TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE. MONTAGUE, Nov 25—The regular annual meeting of the King's Co. Temperance Alliance was held in Montague, on the 9th inst, the County being fairly well represented. The President, Rev. F. A. Whiteman, reviewed the work of the year, showing what had been attempted and what accomplished. After the payment of annual dues, the election of officers took place and resulted as follows: President, Wm McLeod, Bridgetown; Vice-President, S. M. Martin, Heathcote; Directors:—Daniel Ross, Union Road; Edward Bulpitt, Rosemeath; Fred Masher, Bristol; L. J. Mason, Mt Stewart; E. A. McPhee, Montague; Sect'y-Treas'r., D. L. McKinnon, Montague. The conditions prevailing throughout the County with respect to the enforcement of the "Prohibition Act, 1900" were viewed for large and thoughtful consideration. It is feared that liquor-selling is quite prevalent in all the large centres in the country and is carried on with the consent or connivance of those in authority. Frequent petitions and protests have been sent in to the Government in regard to those matters, but so far no action has been taken. The following resolutions relative to those matters were unanimously passed:—(1) Resolved that we request the Provincial Government to increase the salaries paid to Inspectors under the Prohibition Act, 1900, for King's County, that the said salaries shall be made proportionate to those paid to the Inspectors in Prince and Queen's counties; and

Further Resolved that copies of this resolution be sent to the Premier and all members of the Legislature for King's County. (2) Resolved that in view of the lax and very unsatisfactory manner in which the Prohibition Act, 1900 has been administered in northern and eastern Kings, this Alliance would strongly urge the dismissal of the present Inspector, M. J. Campbell, and the appointment of a more efficient officer. (3) Resolved that this Alliance reaffirms resolutions previously passed in re the Inspector for Southern Kings, viz, Henry Campbell, and again requests the Government to dismiss him and appoint in his place a more competent person and one in sympathy with the enforcement of the Prohibition Act, 1900.

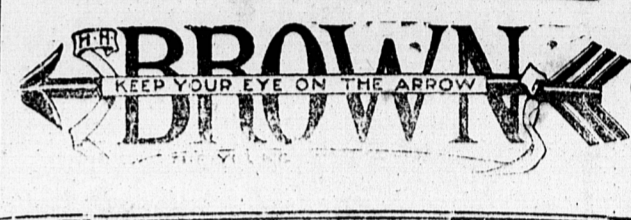

NEW QUEBEC BRIDGE.
MONTREAL, Nov. 25.—Tenders have been asked for the construction of the Quebec Bridge, estimated at \$2,500,000 to replace the old piers which cost \$1,500,000.

Tenders will also be asked for the superstructure to be nickel steel instead of carbon steel weighing 130,000,000 pounds, against 70,000,000 pounds—the weight of the former structure. All the present piers will be demolished.

The new North pier will be located 55 feet further out into the river. The total cost is estimated at \$10,000,000 and the bridge to be completed in five years.
