

Trade Treaty Will Benefit Both Countries

OTTAWA, June 26.—A new trade arrangement between Canada and Newfoundland will become effective next Saturday, June 30, according to official information obtained here this evening. By that pact Canada will extend to Newfoundland the benefits of the British preference and in return Newfoundland will accord to Canada the most favored nation treatment.

Another important feature of the arrangement, particularly for Newfoundland, is the restoration of the steamship subsidy by Canada to the steamship services between Canadian ports, such as Sydney and Halifax, and St. John's, the subsidy amounting to \$35,000 per annum. A similar subsidy had been in force up until four years ago.

It was largely through the urgent representations of Sir John Bennett, a member of the Newfoundland government who was here some time ago, that the steamship subsidy was renewed, as it will be of particular benefit to Newfoundland which really does not get much other advantage from having extended to her the British preference as most of the important items of import from Newfoundland into Canada, come in free now, such as iron ore and fish.

Another factor in the making of the new arrangement were the repeated representations of Canadian manufacturers that they were under a considerable advantage in selling to Newfoundland, particularly respecting to United States business which for some time has had the advantage over Canada in that market.

FORM SOCIETY TO PROMOTE A NATIONAL PARK

BATHURST, June 26.—The suggestion of D. S. Creaghan, that a society be organized to further the securing of the proposed national park for New Brunswick, was acted upon at a meeting here last night of representative citizens of Campbellton, Newcastle, Chatham and Bathurst.

The following officers were named: Byron Trozer, president of the Mirmichil Fish and Game Protective Association, president; George Gilbert, K. C., Bathurst, vice-president; W. H. Davidson, Newcastle, secretary-treasurer; directors, George Wallace, Campbellton; W. S. Montgomery, Dalhousie; E. P. McKay, Bathurst; T. H. Whalen, Newcastle; John Martin, Chatham; Mayor Budd A. Taylor, Moncton; Richard O'Leary, Richibucto; Mr. Fournier, Edmundston; Percy Marston, Woodstock. The name of the new organization is the National Park Association of New Brunswick.

Major H. H. Ritchie, chief game warden for the province, said that he considered a location which would reach within a day or two to the coast would be most advisable. He pointed out that the Bald Mountain area was the head of four rivers with a number of lakes in the vicinity and beautiful scenery as well.

A resolution expressing a desire to co-operate with all associations in the national park project and urging a full investigation of all available locations, particularly the Bald Mountain district, was passed. Mr. Trozer was chairman of the meeting, with J. L. Ryan, Bathurst, secretary.

P. E. I. MILITARY UNITS INTO CAMP NEXT WEEK

For Twelve Days Training On July 2nd—Staff From Halifax Permanent Force To Direct Training And Administration Camp.

The militia units of Prince Edward Island commence their annual training next week, the camp of instruction opening on Monday, 2nd July when the personnel of the Royal Canadian Infantry and Royal Canadian Medical Corps. It is understood that the training will be progressive, culminating toward the end of the camp with tactical exercises, at which the District Officers Commanding, Colonel Commandant W. W. P. Gibsons, M. G., D. S. O., O. B. E. of Halifax will be present. During his visit the District Officers Commanding will carry out the inspection of the several units in training. Colonel Commandant Gibsons will arrive at Charlottetown Camp on Wednesday evening, 11th July and remain until Saturday.

The 1st Medium Brigade, Canadian Artillery, under Lt. Col. J. F. Hooper, will carry out annual firing practice at Petewawa Camp, in Ontario, in August. The artillery will not be in camp with the other units this year.

Dwelling House Destroyed By Fire

As nothing could be done to save the building, the neighbors who quickly gathered assisted Mrs. Greenan and daughter to remove most all furniture below, but all in rooms upstairs was destroyed, as well as a considerable sum of money.

Much sympathy is felt for Mr. Greenan as the loss is a very heavy one. The neighbors have shown their generosity by giving lumber and assisting in chopping and hauling from the woods of a nearby friend who has given free gratis, what lumber will be required for a new dwelling that will be erected as soon as possible.

The loss is estimated at about \$2,000.00, with a small amount of insurance.
