SCOTLAND YARD PROBES LONDON BLASTS

SEEK I. R. A. TERRORISTS IN BOMBINGS

Seven Persons Injured By Explosions In Two Key Subway Stations.

LONDON, Feb. 3.—(CP)—Scotland Yard mobilized its full strength tonight in a determined hunt through fog-bound London for Irish Republican Army terrorists suspected of bombing two key subway stations and injuring seven persons today in two serious explosions.

Canadian Veterans Of Spanish Civil War Are Glad To Be Back Home

HALIFAX, Feb. 3.—(CP)—A nine-car troop train sped westward from Halifax tonight, bearing the remnants of the nearly 300 members of the Mackenzie-Papineau Battalion who landed here today from the steamship Duchess of Richmond after months in war-torn Spain.

Another but smaller group, many of them the more seriously wounded veterans of the Spanish Civil War, will follow next week, practically completing evacuation of Canadians in Spain.

NO CHEERING CROWDS

Their clothing was shabby, ill-matched, nondescript. Their food was what friends and sympathizers placed aboard before the train left. No cheering crowds greeted them at the docks or when they passed through stations. Only a few veterans carried no arms. They were gay and despondent by turns, gay because they were back in Canada; despondent because they were fighting for what nearly all admitted was a lost cause.
