
Mrs. J. A. BRACE and Miss Mary Brace, Summerside, leave on Wednesday on an extended trip to Alberta.

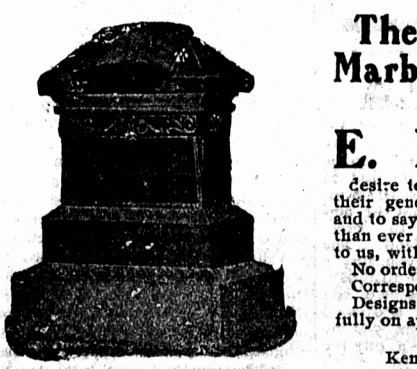
