OBITUARY.—At Wigmore Road, Lot 20, on March 22, 1899, John W. McKay, in the 79th year of his age, after a lingering illness of three years, which he bore with Christian patience and resignation. He was much respected and esteemed in the community as was evidenced by upwards of one hundred sleighs which followed the remains to the Cemetery at Clifton. He leaves a widow, four sons and three daughters to mourn. Several sons and daughters now reside in the United States.

THURSDAY forenoon Charles Watling was convicted of a breach of the Liquor Regulation Act and fined \$100 and costs or two months imprisonment. A separate charge against Mrs. Watling was adjourned until the fifth of April. James McNally, for drunkenness, was fined \$5 or 30 days. Being a cripple the Magistrate gave him the alternative of returning to his home in the country within two hours. James McGuigan, charged on complaint of his wife, with beating and otherwise illtreating her, failed to appear on the summons and a warrant for his arrest was ordered to issue. The hearing of the case stands adjourned until he is apprehended.

THE Easter music at the First Methodist church promises this year to be up to the standard. The new organist has been two months in charge and anticipation is rife as to the results of his drilling. The Festival services afford an opportunity for display, that the organist is not slow to grasp; that he does not lack energy is evidenced by the fact that three Festival services will be held. The Sunday morning service includes an Anthem by N. H. Allen; one by Bailey and Scully's "Resurrection;" Baritone Solo by Mr. L. W. Cook. The evening service includes an Anthem by Woodward, a Solo by Miss Hettie Collings and the Gloria from the 12th mass. The third Festival service will be held on Tuesday evening as mentioned elsewhere.

A MEETING under the auspices of the Red Point Branch of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association was held in the schoolhouse at Red Point on Wednesday, the 22nd inst, to take into consideration the building of a cheese factory at or near Red Point. Alfred Fraser, Esq., President of the Branch, occupied the chair, and the undersigned was appointed Secretary. Speeches showing the necessity of and the benefits to be derived from such a work were made by F. S. Robertson, William McLean, Cyrus M. Stewart, Alex. Robertson, John E. Robertson and Jos. Moran. A vote was taken to test the feelings of the meeting on the building of a factory and resulted unanimously for a factory. Considerable discussion then took place as to whether it would be advisable to proceed with the work this spring so as to have it in operation for this season's work; it was, however, decided to suspend work until next fall for the following reasons: 1st. This is a poor time to solicit stock, the crops last year being poor and money consequently very scarce. 2nd. Some of those who would have a large interest in the factory are directors of Lakeville factory. 3rd. The majority of the people of Red Point, West River and Baltic have already agreed to send milk to Lakeville this year, and calls for tenders for the carrying of milk from those sections have already been issued from that factory. The speeches throughout had the right ring about them, and argued well for the building and success of the "Red Point Cheese Factory." The meeting adjourned to meet the first week in October.—JOHN J. CAMPBELL, Secretary.
