NEW YORK, Nov. 6 — There is apparently no change in the Maritime strike and aside from this the only news domestically is concerning the dividend action. May Dept. directors placed the common stock on a \$3 basis against a \$2 basis previously. Collins and Alkan declared an extra of \$1 and the regular 50 cents. Phelps Dodge declared the 25 cent special. Hollander declared \$1 on the common. Dividend meetings today are Standard Oil of N.J. and probably Indiana. It was thought that Chrysler might meet today but according to the Journal of Commerce this morning directors are not scheduled to meet until November 10 which is next Tuesday. General Motors will meet for action on Monday. We would look for a firm and active market today and expect the oils to be in the lead. Standard Oil of New Jersey and Indiana will no doubt be influenced by the dividend meetings today. The Barber Company acted better yesterday than it has for several weeks. Earnings reported for nine months would hardly justify current levels, but apparently the company's business is on the uptrend. Noel Barber

MINING

TORONTO, Nov. 6—(CP)—Interest turned to the gold group more decidedly today in the Toronto mining section operations and high-price, secondary and junior yellow metal issues changed hands in heavy volume, a majority of them at higher prices. Profit-taking continued in the base metals, carrying prices lower on the whole, while oils were buoyant and silvers strong.

Lake Shore pushed up to 59 but held only part of the gain of 5 1/2. Dome registered a point advance. Buffalo-Ankerite 1-8, Pioneer 10 cents and Wright Hargreaves 5 cents. Little Long Lac trailed with a gain of 25. Bralorne 15, Macassa 25, Hardd Rock 22, MacLead-Cockshut 35, Pamour 25 and Toburn 12.

Moneta traded heavily and held around 1.66. Losses of 4 to 7 cents each were boarded for Gunnar, Argosy, Biggood-Kirkland, Mining Corporation, O'Brien, Pickle Crow, Read-Anthier, San Antonio and Towagmac.

Cost Copper, down 1.50, had the big loss in the base metals. Sherwit was offered in volume at a final drop of 17 cents to 2.58 and Hudson Bay closed 1-2 down at 30 3-4. Noranda dropped 1-4.

Royalite Oil gained 2 1-2 to 34. Homestead 3 1-2 to 53. Home Oil 1 to 1.38 and small gains came out for Acme, East Crest and Olga.

Graded egg shipments in carlots or less were quoted at 44 to 46 cents a dozen for A-large, 41 to 42 for B-large and 22 to 23 for C. Cheese averaged 13 to 13 1-4 cts. per pound for Ontario and 12 1-2 to 13-4 for Quebec.

First Woman Jailed For Auto Killing

CONVICTED AS NEGLIGENT IN KILLING OF PEDESTRIAN, SHE GETS INDEFINITE TERM

NEW YORK, Nov. 3—Mrs. Mary Bouton, twenty-two years old, first of her sex in the state to be convicted and sent to prison for criminal negligence in an automobile death under provisions of a law which became effective on September 1, was sentenced by Judge Charles S. Coiden in Queens County Court to an indefinite term in the New York County Penitentiary despite a plea by her lawyer that she was an expectant mother.

"A woman who knows she is facing a criminal charge has no right to get married and then, when and if convicted, plead expectant motherhood as a grounds for leniency," Judge Coiden said. Her term may extend from three months to three years, at the discretion of the Parole Board.

Mrs. Bouton, the former Mary Schittone, lives at 32-52 107th Street, Corona, Queens. She was married on December 29, 1935, the date of the accident. An automobile she was driving turned from Polk Avenue left into 104th Street, Corona, mounted the sidewalk and struck Paul Cigalla, sixty-five years old, of 34-54 106th Street, Corona. WINNIPEG, Nov. 6—(CP)—The export sale of 200,000 bushels of Canadian wheat proved insufficient on the Winnipeg grain exchange today to stem recessions in the price of futures.

Scattered selling that found the market lacking aggressive buying power left values 1 to 3-4 cent lower, November closing at \$1.09, December \$1.06 1-8, May \$1.07 3-8 and July \$1.05 1-2.

Trading throughout the session, however, was slow in the aggregate. Dullness prevailed also in the cash and coarse grains markets, where prices generally held steady.

- Loans made to owners only. Properties on which loans may be made include: private homes, duplexes, small apartment houses, farm-houses and combination store and dwelling houses.
- Standing of taxes, mortgage payments, etc., to be acceptable to the lending institution.
