Five Montrealers

Jailed in Picture Contest Racket

SUBURRY, Ont., Feb. 15 (CP)—Dubbed by Judge Edmund Froh as "men without hearts," five Montrealers were sentenced today to jail terms ranging from 10 months to three years for operating a picture contest racket estimated to have drained \$20,000 from the pockets of "old and decrepit persons in backwoods concessions."

The men allegedly promised big returns for sponsoring the pictures in an art contest, and obtained sums of money to aid in obtaining the prizes. In one case a cheque was raised from \$18 to \$1,800.

Alfred Lariviere, alleged leader of the group, was sentenced to three years for conspiracy and forgery which he will serve in addition to a similar term in Quebec Province, the same offence. J. Vadeboncoeur, serving a three-year term in Quebec, was given two years.

On charges of conspiracy, W. Arsenault was sentenced to 15 months, Paul Bourdon, serving one year in Quebec, to 12 months, and J. Gagnon, former Montreal policeman, to 10 months.
