COLOR BATHS TEAR GAS FOR CURE INSANITY CRIMINALS

(Canadian Press) WORCESTER, Mass., May 21.—Some colors are stimulants and some are sedatives, and judicious prescriptions of the proper shades will bring beneficial results to individuals of weakened or diseased minds, and even for persons of normal mentality in ill health. This is the theory of Dr. William A. Bryan, superintendent of the Worcester State Hospital for Mental Diseases.

He reports that color baths, originated by him, are being used effectively as a cure for insanity, suggesting that an external application of Nile green may be just what many sufferers need to tone up their systems as a spring tonic.

The "green room" at the hospital is the most striking sample of his experiments. The walls are painted a light green and the transparent green shades of the windows make the sunlight which sifts through them of the same hue. Four large bath tubs are the only furnishings, and they also are painted green. Victims of mental diseases sit in water baths in the tubs with sheets drawn tight over the tubs, leaving only their heads exposed.

(Canadian Press.) WASHINGTON, May 21.—The commercial use of tear gas is steadily increasing. A firm in Chicago which manufactures devices for projecting this gas has equipped 5,000 tanks and 250 Police Departments.

It banks the tear gas releasing mechanism is installed inside the vaults or around the windows. When an attempt is made to rob the bank some one pushes a button and the gas is released. It effectively stops the robbers.

Adopted by police and public safety departments is said to wait only upon the production of policemen's clubs, gas guns, grenades and other projecting implements.

A Pittsburg manufacturer is making a club for policemen with a trigger attachment. An officer armed with this device merely pulls the trigger and discharges the gas directly into the face of the person resisting arrest.

AIR FORCE HEAD TO GO TO ENGLAND

(United Press.) OTTAWA, May 21.—Wing Commander W. G. Barker, V.C., officer commanding the Royal Canadian Air Force, will sail June 4 for England, where he will remain for a year as liaison officer to the Royal Air Force.

During his absence Wing Commander J. S. Spott, M.C., A.F.C., will be in command of the Royal Canadian Air Force. Wing Commander E. W. Stedman, O. B. E., will leave for England June 8, where he will spend six months attached to the British air force.

SIX PERSONS KILLED IN TRAIN CRASH AT RALEIGH, N.C.

RALEIGH, N. C., May 21.—Six persons were killed, one was probably fatally injured and five others less seriously hurt today when a seabornd air line local passenger train crashed into an express train standing in the yards at Apex, N. C., 16 miles south of Raleigh. A news agent, two negro brakemen, a negro woman passenger and two unidentified negro passengers were killed. The injured were members of the train crew.

"FATHER OF 57" TO GO ON TRIAL IN PA. COURT

PITTSBURGH, May 21.—Helen Bertram Allen, "Father of fifty-seven" adopted children, who is in jail here on charges of violating the Mann Act, will be placed on trial in United States District Court within a month, it was learned from the United States Attorney's Office.

Allen has been in jail here since last February, when an episode in a downtown hotel landed him in the hands of the authorities. The "father of 57" became widely known in 1919 when he was subjected to a suit in Washington D. C., courts by James Cruze, whose wife and daughter were said to be in Allen's company.

It was learned that Allen had plantations in Virginia and North Carolina where he conducted schools. He is alleged to have brought poor white boys and girls from remote mountain regions to his plantations, where he educated them and then adopted them in the courts of Virginia.

Through the activities of the children's service bureau of Pittsburgh and the United States Department of Justice (Allen was arrested in Los Angeles last Fall and after ten weeks' litigation he was returned to Pittsburgh to face criminal charges.)

Allen is alleged to have brought one of his "daughters," Gladith "Gypsy" Allen, 17, also known as Myrtle Cruze, to Pittsburgh from Cabot, Va.

The girl is now being cared for by the Children's Service Bureau.

PURE-BREED BREEDERS ESTABLISHES A RECORD

Considerable interest has been aroused of late over the deliveries at stock yards and packing plants of hogs which grade a high percentage of select.

On April 28th, Mr. Alex Dynes, a pure-bred Yorkshire breeder of Ottawa, established a record for Ontario when he delivered 63 hogs to the Canadian Packing Company's plant at Hull, all of which graded select bacon.

The 63 head weighed 13,300 lbs. or an average of 211 lbs. per hog, consequently were an extremely well finished lot. The most outstanding feature of this shipment was the remarkable length and smoothness of the hogs, which, when killed, were further characterized by the uniform thickness of streak.

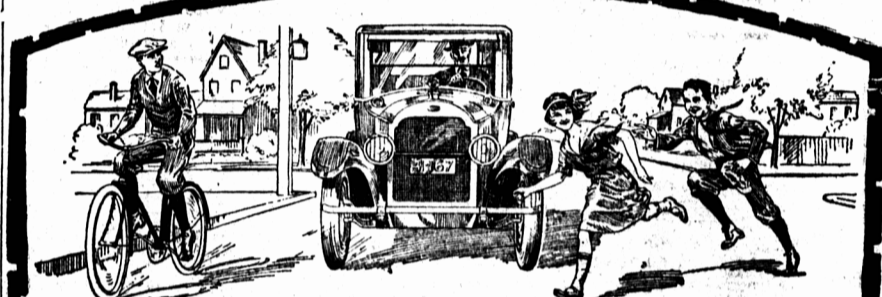

Cycling Safer Than Walking

A CHILD who suddenly darts out from the sidewalk into the road in a game of tag, or one who jumps from behind a standing vehicle, is far more likely to be run down by a motor car than a child on a bicycle.
