**History Of Hats**

Mustapha Kemal is advising his Turkish fellow citizens of both sexes to modernize their headgear. He would have the women abolish their veils and the men throw away the fez and put on the civilized hat. "We must show that we are civilized people," he says. "We must adopt the modes of the civilized world. The fez we wear is not even a part of a national costume. It is of Greek origin. We shall discard it and wear the hat, the international headgear." It never occurs to us to inquire what effect the hat has had on man nor what the relation may be between his headgear and his prospects as a human being. Furthermore, it is strange as it may seem there is no philosophy of the hat. Worse than that there is no history of it. We have only the most sketchy knowledge for example, what mankind did with its head in the back of the Reformation. Historians, theologians, philosophers and all sorts of inquisitors have ransacked the past to find what was in the heads of ancient men, what their theories, reasons, systems, thought and belief, but nobody has seemed to care what they had on the outside of their heads. And that fact ought to rub the scientists and historians pretty hard.

**Hittite Wore Hat Tight.**

The hat has had a long history of ups and downs, as far as we know that history. We modernize our heads when we are told that human thought and belief have had a zigzag and tortuous course through the centuries. The hat has fared much worse, writes Herbert G. Towne in the Philadelphia Public Ledger. When the hat first appeared over the horizon of the kings and queens and was a tall cylinder somewhat resembling a factory chimney. The Greeks and Romans were mostly bareheaded folk. They had the causia, the petasus, the pileus, which were forms of felt hats, sometimes wide-brimmed and sometimes narrow and rolled; but these were for travelers or special wear and were often tied under the chin bonnet-fashion. The men wore the dressy and common Hood and Cap.

In the middle ages we run into the hood-and-cap period, but by the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries the modern hat began to come on the scene, along with the printing press and a lot of disarming and revolting new-fangled inventions. The straw hat got under way as early as the eighteenth century and for almost three centuries following was the universal cut-up among hats, so to speak. It ran to all sorts of fantastic styles and shapes and decorations. But all hats in general for both men and women began to dance to the tune of the changing fashions, and there has been much hat stability since. Along in the fifteenth century slender elegant forms of the rim would touch the knees of the wearer. The broad serated, willow-flopping rim has had at out as long other hat style extant. The women took the lead away from the men at the beginning of the century that brought Elizabeth and Elizabeth on the stage and began what to the Eiffel Tower hat. The peaks, cornucopias, plumed, architecture of the hat and hair dress of Elizabeth and pre-Elizabethian times were a sight to behold.

**Struck by Reformation.**

And then all of a sudden the English Reformation seized upon the hat and tore it to pieces. Puritan Quaker took the hat down not only several pegs, but reduced all its grandeur, its feathers, its leather, fur and to nothing. The hat of the future was plucked out of it. The gay ribbons, feathers, colors, silken materials and softness were banished to outer darkness, and for more than 200 years the hat for both men and women went into a mourning period. Even so, Puritan and Pilgrim invented a headgear, that to us of today appears quite queer. The people had had no feather and exterior ornaments, and the hat lost in ornamentation; and the latter sugar-loaf felt of broad brim and fluted quality of cloths and becoming topping for grave and dignified men folk. The cavalier, of course stuck to his unregenerate hats of varied style, feathers, bands, buckles and all. Just how standardized the modern plug and derby and out of all this ancient diversity until now all religiously uniformities and vagaries of thought and one top-piece that is almost utterly characterless. Is a problem that beats evolution all hollow.

"Be as Good as Your Hat."

Only less interesting is the native assumption of the Turkish President that our flat, brimless and unprofitable (or at least uncomfortable) modern style headgear is the civilized hat. And yet it does seem to be so. All that we need now, therefore, are more people who will live up to their hats. The civilized hat ought to have civilized heads to

**Says Bureau Did Have Trips on Margaret**

WATERWAYS, Alta., Aug. 30.—Mr. Justice Clark today resumed the investigation into the conduct of the last Federal election in Athabasca riding. The Hanging Stone Creek poll, "New Waterways," was the first one dealt with. The enumerator was N. Demers, the D. R. O., Albert Laberge, and the poll clerk, John B. Laberge. Of these the enumerator is out of the district and the poll clerk is at present in the United States.

Corporal McDonald, of the Provincial detachment at McMurray, told of efforts to serve a number of persons wanted as witnesses, "unknown," while others had left the district.

This poll had 96 names on the voters' list, and gave Crose 47 votes, Gauvreau 1, and Kellner 1. Albert Laberge, the D. R. O., said Bill Lawlor appeared to be looking after the poll. His appointment as D. R. O. came from Lawlor he thought, but not direct, as he was asked to act by the enumerator, N. Demers. Taken through the list of persons who voted at the poll, Mr. Laberge was unable to identify several of the names, though he had lived in the district for over five years. Some of these voters, he said, were railroad laborers and were working on the grade, though he did not know where they lived, "these fellows," Laberge admitted as R. D. Tighe, counsel for the Commission, read out name after name from the list.

**TWO THOUSAND HARVESTERS JOBS OPEN AT SASKATOON**

SASKATOON, Sask., Aug. 28.—Two thousand harvesters are said to be open at the local employment bureau with no men to fill them, and immigrants on the line by farmers as their trains pass by.

In the preserving of Canadian vegetables for commercial sale, nearly 400 tons of salt are used each year and in fruit-preserving nearly 3,000 tons of sugar. This is in addition to the vast quantities used up in the old fashioned way on the kitchen range, says the Natural Resources Intelligence Service of the Department of the Interior.
