Late Market News

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Que., April 7.—The following changes were made today in milked prices on the Montreal market. Bran, advanced 2¢ per ton, shorts, increased 1¢ per ton, middlings, reduced 3¢ per ton. A further substantial advance in car lot prices for potatoes was made today, quotations were raised 15 cents to 20 cents per ninety pounds. Three advances being similar to one made last Friday. Rain at loading points in the Maritime Provinces making roads bad for hauling purposes, is blamed for the shortage of supplies here. The opinion was expressed that the market might go still higher before any reaction set in. Demand was reported as strong and with the available supplies in dealers warehouse, being rapidly cleaned up. New Brunswick green mountains were quoted today at \$1.95 to \$2 and Quebecs at \$1.80 to \$1.85 per 90 pounds in bulk in car lots here. Butter prices continued their downward tendency. Wholesale levels for large lots today were one half cent below the close of last week's. New Zealand finest creamery butter on spot being quoted at 31 1-2 to 33 cents per pound. Solids were 35 cents and prims 36 cents per lb to the retailers. Receipts today were 1,107 boxes. The egg market ruled steady with Ontario fresh selling at 31 cents for extras, 29 for firsts and 27 for seconds delivered in Montreal. Receipts were plentiful, amounting to 2,747 cases. The cheese market was unchanged with receipts at 37 boxes. New Maple syrup was reduced today on account of increasing arrivals. Prices to retailers per imperial gallon today were \$2.10 to \$2.20. New maple sugar was steady at 23 to 25 cents per pound. OTTAWA, Ont., April 7.—A little more active carlot buying of eggs is reported today with prices generally ruling unchanged. TORONTO: This egg market continued steady and unchanged. A number of cars of Prairie Province eggs have been sold on a basis of extras 31, firsts 29 delivered here. British Columbia firsts are offering at extras 27, firsts 25 f.o.b. Vancouver. Freight six cents, but buyers here are not interested at these prices. MONTREAL: Egg receipts here yesterday were 2,747 cases as compared to 1,502 cases on the corresponding day last year. There is some accumulating of stocks and the tone is a little weaker. Less car lot shipments are selling on spot at extras 30, firsts 28, seconds 26. WINNIPEG: Egg markets throughout Manitoba and Saskatchewan are not showing much change over the week end. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extras 25, firsts 23, seconds 20, at Saskatoon paying prices have been reduced to extras 22, firsts 20, seconds 17. VANCOUVER, B. C.: There is a good demand for eggs here, both for immediate consumption and storing, and prices are holding steady. Dealers are quoting producers extras 24 to 25 cents, firsts 22 to 23 cents pullets extras 20 to 22 cents.
