It is supposed the men in some way got into the cellars of the first two firms and then crawled through a hole into the residence of Jenkins & Sons. In this store a small amount of money was stolen, and then taking the bar of the inside of the back door the unwelcome visitors walked off. As far as can be learned Sanderson & Co., and A. N. MacKay lost nothing. No clue of the thieves has been obtained.

Angus Morrison, an old resident of St. Peter's, died very suddenly Saturday evening. Mr. Morrison was on his way to Milton Henderson's to do some work, and when opposite the residence of William Cox he complained of feeling weak. Some persons near by assisted him into Mr. Cox's house. A doctor was called but Mr. Morrison expired in a short time. The deceased was in his 83rd year and a carpenter by trade. His children survive him, one daughter Mrs. Greeley Louis in St. Peter's and the rest of the family in the States. Mrs. Morrison pre-deceased her husband some eight years ago.


