ON THE SPANISH FRONT:— Falset Captured By Insurgents

LERIDA, Spain, Jan. 12 (AP)—Spanish insurgents reported tonight their forces in Catalonia had speeded their advance on Tarragona, Mediterranean Port, by capturing Falset.

Insurgent reports said the Moroccan Army Corps which took Falset (in whose vicinity there are lead and manganese mines) took dominating positions of an improved highway and occupied the village of Marsa, two miles from Falset.
