FRENCH FORCES OCCUPY ESSEN WITH MACHINERY OF WAR

Germans Have Recalled Ambassador From Paris and Minister from Brussels. Germans Regard Versailles Treaty as Broken and will Decline Negotiations with Reparations Commission.

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, Jan. 11.—Dr. Wilhelm Mayer, German Ambassador to France, left Paris for Berlin at noon without notifying the French Foreign Office. Diplomatic relations between the two countries are considered in Paris as unchanged.

French and Belgian troops occupied Essen, the heart of the Ruhr region and about fifteen per cent of the total area. Not a shot was fired during the occupation. The army is perfectly equipped for active service and work is progressing as usual.

Labor organizations in the affected area plan to call a brief strike as a general protest against French occupation. The German Government is reported to be considering the peace treaty broken and its execution inoperative.

She will have no further negotiations with the reparations commission unless "this injustice" is removed. She will reduce the use of alcoholic beverages and declare Sunday a day of national mourning.

French airplanes dropped leaflets of warning over Essen, calling upon the populace to remain quiet and at work. BERLIN, Jan. 11.—The transportation of coal on the reparations account ceased at 9 o'clock this morning by order of the German Government.

PARIS, Jan. 11.—Premier Poincaré in his statement before the Chamber of Deputies said the Government's plans provided for the eventual occupation of Bochum if Germany fails to carry out its French demands. The occupation of Bochum which is the site of the iron and steel works of Hugo Stinnes is said to be set for Saturday although this is not officially confirmed.

LOCAL CASES WILL BE THOROUGHLY LOOKED INTO

Evidence in War Medical Cases is Being Prepared to Submit to Royal Commission.

A meeting for the purpose of taking preliminary evidence to be presented before the Royal Commission of the Soldiers Civil Re-establishment which meets shortly at Halifax and St. John was held last night in the G. W. V. A. rooms. President P. E. Palmer presiding.

In his address, the Governor General said: "The future of Canada depends much upon its schools. Peace has its victories no less renowned than the victories of war. So it is that to the schools it is looked for secure that which father and brother have won in battle."
